

AGGIE WRESTLERS SEEK COAST TITLE

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 29.—The Oregon Aggie wrestling team, winners of the northwest intercollegiate championship, are endeavoring to get a try at the University of California to decide the Pacific Coast conference title. California won from Stanford on March 17, and O. A. C. won meets from both University of Washington, 8 to 3, and W. S. C. 's to 0.

At the Coast conference meeting last December the matter was talked over, and it was tentatively decided that the winners of the northwest championship should travel to Stanford, which was conceded to have the best chances of winning the dual meet between the California matmen and those from Corvallis. Definite word regarding the meet has not yet been received from the south, but is expected soon, according to Coach Arbuthnot.

Sam Armstrong, veteran of the squad of 1919, was recently elected captain, to fill the place left vacant by "Spud" Buttervich, who did not return to college this year. Armstrong won both matches this season getting decisions over Bardarson of University of Washington, and Pearson, W. S. C. He is a junior, and will return to participate next year. He hails from Bandon, Or.

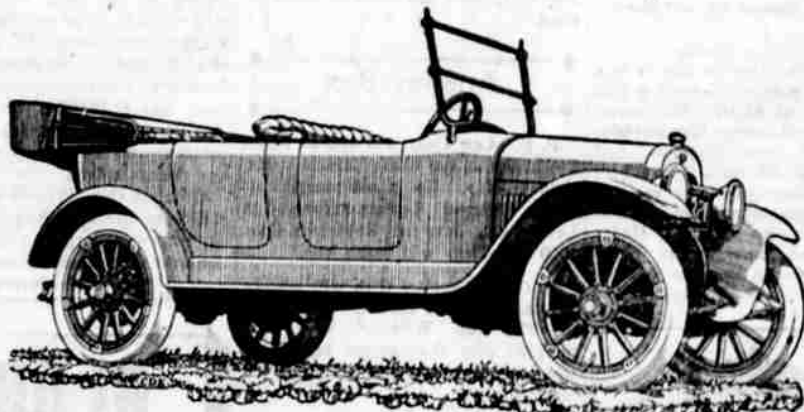
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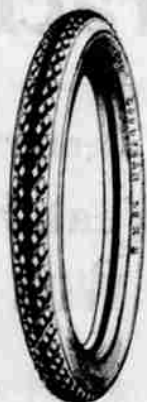
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
