SERVICES FOR THE WEEK OUTLINED

Special services in observance of Holy Week began at St. Mary's church at 7:30 Wednesday night and will be continued until Easter Sunday.

DIVORCE RECORD IS INVESTIGATED

RENO, Nev., April 1—The entire record of the Mary Pickford divorce case is under a close investigation by Robert Richards, deputy attorney-general of Nevada, for the purpose of ascertaining whether it holds any irregularities or evidence of fraud or collusion that would justify an action being taken to set the decree aside. The deputy attorney-general said this morning that when his investigations are concluded action undoubtedly will be taken by the state in case the facts justify it.

MURDER TRIAL BEGINS MONDAY

EUGENE, Or., April 1—Fifty-eight witnesses for the state in the murder trial of Martin A. Clark, which will begin next Monday, have been subpoenaed, and it is believed that the defense will summon about 25 witnesses, according to L. L. Ray, district attorney. The witness who will travel the farthest for the trial is Harry Wise, who lives at Los Angeles. He came from there for the first trial last November. Judge Skipworth granted a new hearing on the ground that evidence at the previous trial did not warrant the verdict of murder in the second degree. Clark is accused of killing Charles L. Taylor, road supervisor of McKenzie Bridge, while they were hunting together in the Cascade mountains last August.

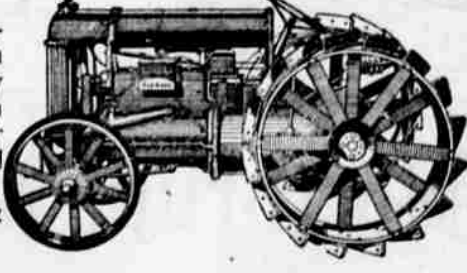
