Members of Disorganized Body Spring Football Practice Starts The Proposed New Road Will Eliminate Big Hill Highway Now in Use.

According to a letter from H. Y. Kirkpatrick, president of the Lebanon Commercial club to C. H. Stewart of the local club, that city will send a delegation of 15 people to this city tomorrow, to go before the county court, in the interest of the proposed new Cascadar road.

As yet the exact time has not been definitely decided upon.

The new road was proposed in a petition which came up before the count ordered that the proposed route of the road be surveyed, which was done and viewers were appointed, and have filed their report.

The proposed new road is to be six miles in length, starting at Shays hill, several miles southeast of Lebanon, and following the Santiam river. It is claimed that if it is constructed thus, the new road will entirely eliminate the big hill road now in use.

Estimates as to the cost of the road range from \$14,000 to \$50,000.
