

STATE SPORTSMEN TO BE ORGANIZED

Effort Being Made to Perfect
An Association in Every
Community.

OBJECT IS TO PRESERVE
AND PROTECT THE GAME

Trout Streams to Be Planted
and Birds Released; The
Railroads Assist.

Special effort is being made by State Game Warden William L. Finley, to organize the sportsmen in every community throughout the state. In many places, organizations have been formed and good results have been secured.

"In order to carry out the work that has been outlined by the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners, it is necessary that we have the active assistance of sportsmen in different parts of the state," says Mr. Finley. "The object of these sportsmen's clubs is to assist the commission in planting trout and other game fish in the various creeks and rivers, and to release different varieties of game birds."

The various railroads in the state have offered free transportation for an especially equipped fish-distributing car, which is considerable saving to the game protecting fund. This car will begin the distributing of fish from the Central Hatchery at Bonneville, the latter part of next month. Applications for trout or game birds should be made immediately through the sportsmen's organizations in each community.

Another object in having the sportsmen organized is to secure a better sentiment in certain localities in favor of game protection. It is planned to have at least one or several such organizations in every county in the state. A general convention of sportsmen is to be held next October or November, at which time delegates will assemble from all over the state. An active campaign will be begun to make Oregon one of the greatest hunting and fishing grounds in the country.

MRS. S. G. IRVINE PASSED AWAY YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

Funeral Services Will Be Held
at the United Presbyterian
Church Tomorrow.

Mrs. S. G. Irvine died yesterday evening shortly after 6 o'clock at her home corner Sixth and Broadalbin streets of paralysis at the age of 75 years.

The deceased was one of Albany's beloved ladies and was held in high esteem by many friends throughout Linn county. She is ranked among the county's earliest pioneers. She was born near Little Fork, Ill., and in company with her father, the late Joseph Martin, crossed the plains by ox team in the year 1852. Her father took up a claim near Peroria, Ore., where they resided for several years, later removing to this city, where the late Mrs. Irvine has retained her residence for the past 42 years.

The deceased is survived by the following children: Mrs. J. W. Blain, of Oakland, Cal., Rev. S. S. Irvine, of Butler, Penn., J. C. Irvine, Mrs. C. H. Stewart and Miss Elizabeth Irvine, of Albany.

The funeral services will be held at the United Presbyterian church tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock and interment will take place in the city cemetery. Rev. W. P. White, pastor of the church will conduct the services. The casket will arrive at the church half an hour before the services commence and will be placed in the vestibule, that those who desire may view the remains.
