Officers of New Organization
Were Elected; A. L. Fisher
Chosen President.

Declaring for the general improvement of Fifth street, making it especially attractive on account of the Oregon Electric passing along it, with its thousands of passengers, the Fifth Street Improvement club was organized in the basement of the U. P. church last night. A. L. Fisher of the Fisher-Braden Co., was elected permanent president and F. P. Nutting secretary and treasurer.

The following executive committee was elected to look after all the interests of the club: The president, secretary, Conrad Meyer, F. M. French, A. C. Schmitt, E. H. Rhodes and E. L. Umphrey.

It was decided to hold a lawn party or social at some place along the street, with short talks by President Joseph H. Young and an O. A. C. landscape artist, and if possible to secure the services of these men in an effort to get the residents of the street together for a conference, with the main purpose in view of creating a general sentiment along the street for its beautifying and permanent improvement. It was strongly urged that the street should have a cluster system of lights and A. C. Schmitt was appointed chairman of a committee to be named by him, to confer with the Oregon Electric officials in reference to securing free "juice" for the purpose.

Among the suggestions were that the curbs should all be kept free from weeds, the lawns kept mowed, the street sprinkled on account of the dust raised by the cars, the court house block improved on the Fifth street side as well as on the Fourth street side, a brick woodshed be built for the jail, and the speed of cars be limited.

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Fall grain looks well and is growing fast, but indications are that the hay crop may be short. There is a large acreage of clover around here, and farmers are taking more interest in raising clover than ever before, as it builds up the land and after a few years it will produce much better crops of grain. Clover seed is in demand and fancy prices are paid for it, many farmers selling their seed for 14 and 16 cents per pound, and now they are buying it back paying 25 cents or more for it. Grass in the pastures has made a good growth, and stock now needs very little attention. Farmers are turning their attention to dairying more and more every year and one can see many young heifer calves on the farms where a few years ago there were none. The annual sale of young calves for veal is the greatest cause of the shortage of the meat supply, and should be stopped by law, as the slaughter of all kinds of young stock is entirely wrong.
