The Lobby.

In testifying before the Senate investigating committee, Senator Lane of Oregon stated that he had been approached by at least three lobbyists during the present session of Congress, one representing the wool interests, one representing sugar and the other the silk industry. He called them by name.

Senator Kenyon of Iowa made the following statement before the same committee: "Social lobbying in Washington justifies every word that President Wilson uttered in regard to the presence of an insidious lobby."

Senator Newlands of Nevada stated that he had been approached by Claus Spreckles of San Francisco and by him urged to oppose free sugar.

Others have given similar testimony, yet some of the partisan republican newspapers are inclined to look with disfavor upon the President's assertion that an "insidious lobby" exists in Washington.

The testimony already given before the senate committee proves conclusively that a lobby does exist and that an effort is being made by paid representatives of the corporations to prevent the passage of a just and equitable tariff bill.

President Wilson is right in demanding the investigation. Not until members of Congress are permitted to exercise their best judgment on pending legislation without being hampered by suggestions from paid lobbyists, can exact justice be expected at the National Capital.

The line number of the Oregon Manufacturer contains a large volume of excellent data on the various manufacturing enterprises in Oregon. Colonel Hofer, the publisher of the magazine, is doing a good work and is entitled to the support of the manufacturing interests of the state.

"Melon" vs. "Lemon."

According to the press dispatches the Standard Oil Company is to cut a \$4,000,000 "melon" by increasing the capital of the company from \$15,000,000 to \$19,000,000. This will be done out of the undistributed surplus of the corporation. On the same date that the "melon" is cut by the Standard Oil company, the common people, from whom these excessive profits were extracted, will cut an ordinary "lemon."

A long line of broken tariff promises, a prolonged period of excessive prices and the organization of hundreds of trusts have made slow and ultra-conservative treatment of the tariff question impossible. An operation is necessary and we know of no better tariff surgeon than Dr. Wilson.

The Chautauqua this year promises to be bigger and better than ever. Thus does Albany retain first place in everything that her progressive and public spirited citizens undertake.

The republican press finds it exceedingly difficult to find anything radically wrong with the administration of Woodrow Wilson. Many of the more independent newspapers openly commend his course in dealing with the various problems which have confronted him during his tenure

of office and his ability, his statesmanship and his honor, are now universally conceded by the vast majority of republican voters.

JOINT COUNTRY CLUB IS PROPOSED

Albany Sportsmen Invite the Corvallis People to Join Forces with Them.

THE PROPOSITION HAS MET WITH MUCH FAVOR

Enthusiastic Meeting Was Held Wednesday Night When Matter Was Discussed.

Relative to the visit of a party of enterprising Albany sportsmen at Corvallis in the interest of the proposed country club, the Corvallis Gazette-Times says:

Shall Corvallis and Albany join in developing a "Country Club" at Granger, midway point on the C. & E. between Corvallis and Albany? It will require from \$10,000 to \$20,000 to get such an institution in good working order and Albany enthusiasts are confident that the Hub City can hold up its end of the string. They are equally confident that nothing is more to be desired and that nothing could prove more efficacious in cultivating the "entente cordiale" between the two cities, which are soon to become the St. Paul and Minneapolis of Oregon.

Wednesday night at the Commercial club rooms, Messrs. Young, Johnston, Leininger, Weatherford, Cusick and Tracy, of Albany, broached the proposition to Corvallisites and explained the plan. In brief, the suggestion is that 75 to 100 acres of ground on the river at Granger be bought, a roomy country club house be built with all accessories. A caretaker should be provided, lunches served at all times and the place kept "dry" and high-toned in every respect. It was argued that Granger is easily accessible by river, electric line and roads, that "dead" water offers opportunity for swimming and boating, groves offer summer coolness and beauty, and a great house with dance floors and card arrangements would offer ideal conditions for indoor entertainment.

The trustees could be secured by a membership of 150 in Albany and 100 in Corvallis, each taking one share of stock at \$50 each, and paying \$100 a month dues.

The Corvallisites listened with pleasure, and agreed that the idea "looked good," but suggested that while the Albanyites have investigated the matter thoroughly and give the matter much thought, the whole thing is new to Corvallis people. For that reason they should be given time to consider the suggestion a little. The Corvallis proposal was that Albany and Corvallis people should hold an early picnic on the proposed site at Granger, take a look at things, talk the matter over at length, and, if found agreeable, then begin a personal canvass for members to such a club.

ANNUAL ORATORIO TO BE HELD JUNE 10

Chorus of 75 Voices Will Present the "Golden Legend" at Presbyterian Church.

THREE PROMINENT SOLOISTS WILL TAKE PART

Local Music Lovers Have Rare Treat in Store in Masterpiece by Longfellow.

On Tuesday evening, in the Presbyterian church, the oratorio "The Golden Legend," by Dudley Buck, will be given by a chorus of 75 voices. The soloists will be Mrs. Adna Smith Flo, Mr. Joseph P. Mulden (Portland), and Mr. J. C. Irvine.

The words of the oratorio were written by Longfellow. At the May festival in Cincinnati in 1880 this was the winning oratorio and Dudley Buck received one thousand dollars as a prize. According to magazine articles the Golden Legend has been given in many of the large cities this year.

There are three soloists, "Prince Henry" the tenor, "Elsie" the soprano, and "Lucifer" the bass. It opens with Lucifer inciting the spirits to drag down the spiral of the Strausburg Cathedral, then the spirits answering that the saints are guarding it. Lucifer in command, seizes bells and hurls them to the pavement, the spirits are blessed by the martyr.

Bells ringing out, closes the first scene.

Prince Henry, who is afflicted with an incurable illness, has consulted the physicians of the day and to no avail, secures a prescription from the college at Salerno which says the only remedy is the "blood which flows from the maiden's veins," who shall give her life as the price of youth.

In the next scene Prince Henry goes into the country, stays at a farm house where Gisla, the young daughter of the household, learns of the prescription and decides to give her life to save that of the prince. She finally decides to go and take up a pilgrimage to Salerno. Arriving at Genoa, they embark for the island. Here is sung the most beautiful chorus in the oratorio, as they sail on the sea. Arriving at Salerno Elsie answers her willingness to give her life, but Prince Henry refuses so beautiful a sacrifice to die.

In the next scene they return to the castle of Prince Henry, where he has recovered his health because of his willingness to give her life. They live happily ever after.

JUDGE KELLY SETS CASES FOR TRIAL

Two Indicted for Bootlegging Were Arraigned This Morning and Pleaded Not Guilty.
