

FINAL EXERCISES START TOMORROW

Forty-First Annual Commencement of Albany College Will Last Four Days.

**SPLENDID ARRAY OF
ADDRESSES ARE ARRANGED**

**Wednesday Is Commencement
Day and the Exercises Will
Take Place in Church.**

The forty-first annual commencement exercises of Albany College are the center of attraction for the next four days. Two important services are to be held tomorrow when President H. M. Crooks will deliver the annual baccalaureate address to the graduating class and Dr. W. P. White, of the United Presbyterian church, will address the Young Men's Christian association and the Young Women's Christian association. The baccalaureate address will be at the First Presbyterian church at 10:30 a. m. President Crooks' subject is to be "Our Daily Bread." It is expected that this address will touch upon some of the live questions of the day such as the minimum wage and its relation to morality and the attitude of the educated man toward money and its use. Several churches will unite with the college in this service. Dr. White's address to the Christian associations will be given at 8 p. m. in the United Presbyterian church. His subject will be "The Gospel of the Cross." This will also be a union service.

Two important events are listed for Monday. President and Mrs. Crooks will be at home at their residence, 618 Washington street, from 3 to 5 p. m., to all of their friends and all of the friends of the college. The invitation is as general as it can be made. This annual reception is always an enjoyable occasion. In the evening at 6:30 p. m. on the college campus occur the senior class day exercises. The big item in these exercises is a play entitled "The Elopement of Ellen." This will be a great attraction. There will be an opportunity to get reserved seats at ten cents.

The events of Tuesday are the annual meeting of the board of trustees; the trustees and faculty luncheon at Tremont Hall at 5:30 p. m.; and the oratorio, "The Golden Legend," at the First Presbyterian church at 8:30 p. m. This oratorio is a \$1000 prize production by Dudley Back in competition for the Cincinnati May Festival and is based upon Longfellow's well known poem. It will be given by 75 voices with Mrs. Flo soprano, Mr. J. P. Mulder of Portland tenor, and Mr. J. C. Irvine baritone, as soloists. This year there will be no charge made for the oratorio. It is entirely free and all are invited.

Wednesday is commencement day, with the graduation exercises at 10 a. m. at the First Presbyterian church. The commencement address will be given by Rev. William Parsons, D. D., of Eugene. The academic procession will form at the college at 9:45 and march to the church. The alumni banquet at 8 o'clock at the United Presbyterian church will close the exercises of the week.

WILL HAVE CLUSTER LIGHTS AT LEBANON

250 Taxpayers Sign Petition to City Council Asking For Their Installation.

The following from the Lebanon Express indicates that the people of that city are progressive:

At the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday evening D. Cormier presented a petition signed by about 250 taxpayers asking that the city install cluster lights in the business district of the city, which would include three blocks on Main street, and about two blocks on Sherman street, making about 32 clusters with 5 lights to the cluster.

The council did not act upon the petition but decided to let the matter go over until next meeting. Mr. Cormier thinks he can get at least 95 per cent of the taxpayers to sign a petition for such lights. To be sure it will cost a little more than the present system, but the lights would be much better and it would be worth more. This would be a great advertising proposition to our city and would add much to the appearance of the place. Thirty-two clusters might be too many to start with, but we think it would be well to put in some clusters and get it started. It will mean much to our growing and thriving little city.

THOUSANDS OF FISH TO BE DISTRIBUTED

State Fish Car Makes Initial Trip Through Valley From Salem to Cottage Grove.

**RETURNED TO CAPITAL
CITY YESTERDAY MORNING**

Corvallis to Get Big Consignment of Lucious Frys For Distribution in Streams.

The state fish car returned to Salem yesterday from a trip to Cottage Grove where 177,000 young fish were left for distribution in the streams around that city. Of the fish left, 50,000 were eastern brook trout and 127,000 rainbow trout.

The car passed through this city Tuesday enroute south, attached to the regular noon passenger train. At Eugene it left four crates of young China pheasants for Senator L. E. Bean, who will distribute them as soon as they are large enough to take care of themselves.

Of the number of young fish left at Cottage Grove, hundreds are to be distributed in the various streams of the southern section of the Willamette valley and in Southern Oregon.

The distribution of the fish and game by the means of this car, which is run in connection with the fish and game department of the state of Oregon, was organized some time ago through the efforts of Game Warden Finley. Free transportation has been provided on all railroads for the car and the idea of it is to replenish the streams and game reserves with fish and fowl, with the products raised at the state game farm and hatcheries. Organizations of sportsmen in various localities have been perfected to work in conjunction with the state authorities for the proper distribution of the game.

On Saturday the car will pass through this city enroute to Corvallis with a consignment of 200,000 trout fry from the state hatchery, and sportsmen will plant them in streams over the county. A special call for all sportsmen, especially members of the Corvallis Rod and Gun club, has been issued for a meeting to make arrangements to care for these fry in the proper way.
