# FOUR TERMS OF CIRCUIT COURT

Under New Law Passed by Last Legislature Sessions of Court Are Changed.

## DEPARTMENTS NUMBERED 11 AND 2 ARE EFFECTED

### Regular Terms Will Begin Hereafter On First Mondays of Designated Months.

By virtue of the new law passed at the last session of the legislature there will hereafter be four terms of circuit court in Linn county each year cuit court in Linn county each year pinstead of three as in the past. Under this new law the regular terms of a Department No. 1 will begin on the liftst Monday in March, the first Monday in March, the first Monday in September and the first Monday in Degember. Regular terms of Department No. 2 will begin on the first Monday of June, the first Monday of October and the first Monday of June, the first Monday of June terms will be the next regular term of Department No. 2, Judge Galloway presiding, which will begin on the first Monday of June to Abolish the old June term, which began the fourth Monday in June. Sevirtue of the change in the popular term of Department No. 1 this year from March until September.
