THE DYING LOBBY

The New York World pays the following glowing tribute to President Wilson and his fight against the Washington lobby:

It was this lobby which enacted and wrote the McKinley tariff, the Dingley tariff and the Payne-Aldrich tariff. It was this lobby which prevented promised tariff revision downward by Republicans. It was this lobby which brought about the veto of bills passed by Democrats and Progressives to reduce the cost of living.

If it had not been for the denunciation of this lobby by President Wilson and the prompt investigation undertaken by congress, a genuine reform of the tariff would not now be on the eve of adoption. The lobby has been exposed and defeated. The World's revelations are the final blow. And we now have the President's word that "it has ceased to embarrass his administration." There will be no more lobbies of this kind in Washington unless the people at the polls again yield to the influences that thrive upon privilege and loot.

For this deliverance, men who have sacrificed the lobby are to be congratulated no less than the millions who have been plundered by it. Mark Hanna's system had placed the whole country under tribute. To get an advantage in the laws, manufacturers and others have submitted to blackmail on all sides. Nothing that will happen to them following the passage of just laws can be worse than the terror and the cost inflicted upon them by the leeches of the lobby.

To be a manufacturer under this system was to confront a loaded pistol in every campaign. To be a Republican was to either co-operate honestly or dishonestly with political brigands or be destroyed. The people did not rule. The party did not rule. Both were overruled by a power that became invincible. Our laws ran in the name of the Senate and House of Representatives, but many of them originated in this lobby, and laws which the people asked for in vain never got beyond this lobby.

Such was the impudent usurpation which was put upon the defensive by the election of President Wilson. Such was the "embarrassment" which he encountered at his inaugurations. Thus far the tide of events has beaten heavily against it. It is possible, in the light of exposures, that a single Democrat in congress will be found base enough, for any reason, to stand forth as its champion?

A NEW KIND OF FOUL.

When Rev. E. W. Buxard, pastor of the Rockefeller church at Cleveland declared that "Mr. Rockefeller is a rose bush in the Lord's garden," he raised a question as to his own sincerity of purpose. He libeled a beautiful flower and attempted to make the dollar sign a true test of Christianity.

Regular attendance at church services is not always a test of a man's Christianity. Teaching a class in Sunday school is not invariably an indication of religious devotion. It requires more than a mere lip service, more than faithful attendance at the house of worship, more than liberal contributions to home and foreign missions, to make men worthy in the sight of their Creator. A through ticket to the Kingdom of God can not be purchased by dollars and cents.

Fame, power, human gratitude and luxury can be bought by this million-aire but "Father Time" soon separates the rich from their riches. Mr. Rockefeller and his own valet stand on an equal footing before the judgment seat. The former will not appear with a retinue of servants. He will be stripped of all wealth, power and influence and like all human beings be held to a strict accountability

for his sins. Loaded down with riches extracted from the sick, the lame, the halt, and the blind, John D. Rockefeller each Sunday, bends the hinges of his knees in mock prayer. While he lifts up his voice to his Creator in that Cleveland church, thousands of his fellow men are starving; thousands are being led into the paths of sin because of lack of adequate funds to sustain themselves in the battle against the world. Yet this Christian gentleman declines them the crust of bread which is theirs by every right of justice and equity.

The Democrat accuses no man of hypocrisy, but if Rockefeller is truly "A rose in the Lord's garden" it is our hope and desire that we smell not of its fragrance.

RADDISH GROWN IN HOME GARDEN WEIGHS 3 LBS.

A. J. Rader Grows Plant Thirty Inches in Length and 6 Inches in Circumference.

Growing to an enormous size without going to seed and weighing one ounce less than 3 pounds, is the remarkable state of a White Winter China raddish, grown in a garden at its home by A. J. Rader, Sixth and Chicago streets.

The plant is splendidly and proportionately formed and measures over 30 inches in length from tip of the sprout to the bottom of the root. The raddish proper measures 16 inches in length and averages 6 inches in circumference. Mr. Rader states that he has grown several large raddishes of this species in his garden but that they all grew to seed with the exception of this one.

NEW RAILROAD WILL TAP RICH TIMBER BELT

Machinery Is Now Arriving for Construction of Valley & Siletz R. R.

Independence, Or., July 8.—Machinery has been arriving for the construction work on the Valley & Siletz railroad, which is to build from Independence to the Siletz Basin and later to the Newport country. There are two of three who are yet holding out against the right-of-way man, but condemnation suits will be brought at the August term of court.

This line will tap some rich country, passing through a fertile part of the Willamette valley, the Luckiamute, McTimmonds and Kings valleys, and touching the Cobb and Mitchell timber holdings, where there is some of the finest timber in the state.

The railroad will be completed to Hoskins, at the head of Kings valley, this year, and next year will reach the timber country. The Falls City Lumber company will build a large sawmill here.
