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CHAMBERLAIN AND LANE

The Democrat offers no apology for the attitude of Senators Chamberlain and Lane in reference to the wool schedule of the Underwood tariff bill. Both Oregon senators made a fight in the Democratic caucus for a slight duty on wool, and were defeated. Because they were unsuccessful in amending the wool section of the tariff act, a partisan Republican press would now have them repudiate the entire measure. For them to do so would be political treason. Chamberlain and Lane were elected to the United States Senate on the Democratic ticket. The Democratic party has always been opposed to the theory of high protection and has always been at war with tariff fostered monopoly. When the Oregon Senators were elected it was assumed that they would fulfill to the letter the pledges contained in the Democratic national platform. For them to now refuse their official sanction to a bill which will afford relief from the present intolerable and excessive duties, because it does not entirely conform to their own personal ideas, would be a repudiation of both party and principle. That they have not yielded to the Washington "lobby" is a matter of congratulation to the Senators from Oregon.

BETTER LAW ENFORCEMENT

A drastic anti-speed ordinance has been prepared and introduced by a Salem councilman. The proposed ordinance provides a penalty of not less than five or more than twenty days in jail in case of conviction. Physicians only are excepted by its provisions and they must carry a red cross on their cars in order to escape prosecution. If officers can be secured with enough moral courage to enforce the law properly it ought to pass. The trouble with the average anti-speed ordinance lies in the unwillingness of the officers to insist upon the enforcement of its provisions. Many officers hesitate when it comes to placing the owner of a motor car under arrest while they display remarkable courage when it comes to taking into custody a defenseless hobnob.

GOOD COUNSEL

"The problem of the delinquent child is the problem of the broken home," said Supt. Chas. H. Meek, of Boise, Idaho, before the University of Oregon Summer School. "If a boy or girl goes wrong it almost always proves to be the case that either death or divorce has separated the parents. Where father and mother are living, and living together, the child has the best chance for moral development." To mothers and fathers, who for some trivial cause, may be contemplating divorce, the words of Superintendent Meek are respectfully recommended. The obligation of parent to child and child of parent is the strongest known to the human family. Personal happiness should be secondary to the responsibility of rearing a family. To a child the counsel and companionship of a father or a mother and to take from him a right which is his by all the laws of nature. True it is that there are cases where divorce is a near blessing to all concerned, but in any event, the husband, wife, and the children are all factors in one of life's tragedies.

JAMES J. HILL'S ADVICE.

Commenting upon the recent foolishness in the Wall Street stock market, James J. Hill gave the stock gamblers some sound advice. The great "Empire Builder" spoke in part as follows: "What is the matter with Wall Street, anyway? Are they going crazy over there? Everyone is as tame as a dog, and half the people do not know what they are doing about it. All that the people have to do in times like these is to keep a clear head and avoid getting rattled; then everything will come out all right. Take it from me, the man who sells the United States 'short' is going to suffer like the mischief. He will have to take his medicine and it will not be sweet, either. The money market is a good deal of a problem, but it will work out all right. Such complications as we have had of late are troublesome, but they are insignificant compared with the offsetting factor of good crops and the wealth that will result from another bountiful harvest. 'I want to say, too, that the Washington situation is all right. To hear some people talk you would suppose that the administration was bent on upsetting things. That is perfect foolishness. I was at the capital the other day and talked to all the leaders, and I know that they are aiming to do the best thing for the whole country.' When a man of Hill's standing expresses himself on financial questions, his opinion is entitled to more than ordinary weight. He is not given to speak lightly on any subject of public importance and has perhaps given the financial situation more careful thought and attention than any other man in America. His words will at least stiffen the spines of the Wall Street 'money changers.' The common people have confidence in the administration and need no encouragement.

NINTH STREET IMPROVED

Council required the Portland, Eugene & Eastern railway company to repair the car tracks at the corner of First and Lyon streets by tearing up the bricks and pavement and replacing with new material, flush with the established grade of the street. The company was given 60 days to make the improvement and the recorder was instructed to send a copy of the ordinance to President Strahorn today. The committee on streets and public property rendered a report which was adopted, recommending the opening of Oak street from Salem to San Juan roads. L. M. Carl, chairman of the building committee of the Knights of Pythias temple, applied to the council for permission to file the plans and specifications of the building for approval. Under the new ordinance it is not necessary to follow this mode of procedure and Mr. Carl was told that if he applied to the city recorder tomorrow the plans and specifications would be investigated by the building inspector and if satisfactory the permit would be issued. A. E. Finley, of the Corvallis Concrete Co. addressed the council relative to a concrete post his company is manufacturing and which has been proposed to the city for its cluster lighting system. The post as represented in a blue print presented a pleasing appearance, and its measurements are given as 20 inches square at the bottom tapering up in a round pillar, 8 inches to 6 inches at the top and mounted, standing 12 feet 8 inches in height with tree lights. With all equipments, including wiring it will cost \$24. The members of the council will go to Corvallis to inspect the post.

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SHE USES TOBACCO; HE WANTS DIVORCE

L. A. Messing Claims Spouse Misrepresented Herself to Him Before Marriage.

MANY ALLEGATIONS ARE MADE IN COM LAINT

Wants Separation on Grounds of Desertion After Trying to Reform Her.

Claiming that his wife prior to their marriage represented herself as a respectable and industrious woman of good habits and then afterwards proving to be addicted to the drink habit, an excessive user of chewing and smoking tobacco and snuff, L. A. Messing, has started suit for divorce from Dania Messing, in the Linn county circuit court on the grounds of desertion. Messing is a young jeweler, and at present resides in Linn county. He and his wife were married at Grants Pass, July 29, 1908, and in his complaint alleges that the desertion occurred at Phoenix, Ore., January 15, 1910. There are no children. According to further allegations in the complaint, Mrs. Messing is charged with consorting with young men, who furnished her with means to carry on her vices. The plaintiff charges that this caused unpleasant talk and friends severely criticised him for continuing to reside with his wife. In the complaint it is claimed that when the plaintiff would refuse the defendant tobacco and whiskey, she would become violently enraged and during one of these fits of passion deserted him at Phoenix, Ore., in 1908, after he had persistently tried to reform her. The plaintiff further claims that he moved from town to town in hopes that his wife may change her tactics and in order to be rid of the gossip following his wife's episodes. On the other hand, Messing in his complaint claims that he is a sober, upright and industrious man and that he stood more than any ordinary man would stand from an inhuman and cruel wife.
