

## STERNBERG BACK FROM TRIP EAST

Returned From 7 Weeks Business Trip and Is Glad to Be Home.

COMING YEAR WILL BE PROSPEROUS ONE

Had Successful Trip--Will Install Ladies Department to Store.

Mr. Albert Sternberg has just returned from a seven weeks trip through the East and South. When interviewed this morning relative to business and his trip, he said: "Yes, I am glad to be back again and breathe the cool fresh air of Albany and this valley, where I have always lived."

"Having covered southern and central states and after taking careful note of conditions, a comparison shows that in general the Willamette valley crop outlook appears better and the general outlook of the West superior to that of any other section visited," said Mr. Sternberg. "While visiting in Kansas and Missouri, the thermometer registered 108 in the shade, the crops being badly burned by the heat and the people of those sections praying for rain."

Mr. Sternberg had a very successful and pleasant trip, booking some large business for the Albany Tanning company, the output of which will soon be greatly enlarged. ## GRANDDAUGHTER OF JOHN BROWN IS IN ALBANY

Decedent of Famous Abolition Martyr Here to Speak to Girls.

"John Brown's Body lies a mouldering in the grave, but his soul goes marching on. There was the spirit of the martyrs of old in the noted Kansas Abolitionist, John Brown, when he gave his life to free the black slaves, and there is that same martyr like spirit in Nell Brown-Groves, granddaughter of the famous border fighter, as she gives her life to the great fight against white slavery and help homeless working girls in the large cities."

Nell Brown-Groves arrived in Albany yesterday and will spend two or three days here in the interest of the work of organizing homes for working girls. She will give an interesting lecture at the Baptist church Friday night, Aug. 15, speaking on the "Actual Living Conditions of the Working Girl and its Relation to White Slavery," illustrating her talk with startling facts and confessions as given by the girls themselves.

Mrs. Groves has spent two years in farm work, and several years investigating the living condition of the homeless working girl in the large cities in the United States, and is now



spending her life in helping these unfortunate girls, in order that they may be able to live an honest and upright life on their meager incomes.

This is a very worthy cause, and one in which every one should be interested, as the army of working girls come from the best homes in the land, and their deplorable circumstances are little known to the general public. The facts as to how and why the social evil thrives have been suppressed too long, and modern fair-minded, self-reliant men and women demand the truth.

Mrs. Groves is a violinist of rare ability, having studied since childhood with some of the best instructors, and having played with many of the larger orchestras throughout the United States. She will render a number of violin solos during the evening. The admission to the lecture will be free, and it is hoped that everybody who can will be present as this money is used toward helping this great cause.

The principal office and place of business of the corporation shall be the city of Albany.

The company is capitalized at \$15,000. The capital stock is divided into 150 shares of \$100 each.

## ARRESTED HERE ON FELONY CHARGE

W. A. Iden Wanted in Tulare County to Answer Charge Against Him.

CHIEF OF POLICE KING MADE QUICK ARREST

Prisoner Was Travelling Under Alias--Admitted Identity to Officer.

Arrested this afternoon shortly after 3 o'clock in the office of the Tebbel Real Estate Co., where he represented himself to be a prospective land buyer, W. A. Iden, alias C. M. Dickey, was taken into custody by Chief of Police Griff King, upon wire instructions from Sheriff W. W. Collins of Tulare county, California, where he is wanted on several charges of alleged felony.

Iden was supposed to be traveling with an eighteen year old son but stated that his son left him to go to work. He admitted his identity. He is now confined in jail awaiting the action of the California authorities who have been notified by Chief King of the arrest.

Iden has been here since August 10 stopping at the Yandran hotel. The room established by Chief King in intercepting the man is considered marvelous in police circles. He received the telegram only a short while before the arrest was made. After looking around the city and consulting the hotel registers, Chief King followed the man to the real estate office on Lyon street.

"Is this Mr. Iden," said the chief upon entering.

Without hesitating, although he caught his breath suddenly, Iden promptly answered in the affirmative. The officer told him he was under arrest on a felony charge. Iden submitted to arrest peacefully. Later he admitted his identity to the officer. He will rest here in custody pending the action of the California sheriff. It is understood that Iden is wanted at Visalia, Calif., to answer the charge against him.

Details concerning any of the charges could not be learned. C. W. Tebbel, president of the Tebbel Real Estate company, in whose office Iden was arrested, stated this afternoon that the man had represented himself to be a prospective land buyer and that he owned property in California which he desired to trade for Willamette Valley property. Mr. Tebbel said that Iden introduced himself as C. M. Dickey.
