

NEW WRINKLE IN CITIZENSHIP LAW

All Men Who Have Made Declaration Over 7 Years Ago Must Apply By Saturday.

FAILURE TO APPLY WILL MEAN A LONG DELAY

John S. Smith, Chief Naturalization Examiner, Writes County Clerk Marks.

Continued from Saturday, Sept. 20

That all men who have made declarations of intention for citizenship more than seven years ago must apply for second papers before next Saturday is the statement of John Speed Smith, Chief Naturalization Examiner for Oregon, Washington and Idaho, in a letter to County Clerk Marks today. His application for final papers is not made before that date the applicant will have to file a new declaration of intention in which event he will have to wait at least two years before he can apply for final papers. Mr. Smith's letter, which gives full information regarding this matter is as follows:

"I deem it proper and only fair that you be advised of the position of the bureau of naturalization relative to declarations of intentions on the part of aliens made prior to September 27, 1906. A decision of the U. S. district court for the Eastern district of Arkansas, Western division, in the case of in re Welch, rendered in 157 Feb. 938, holds the seven year limitation placed upon declarations of intention under the present naturalization law (act of June 29, 1906), will also apply to old law declarations made prior to September 27, 1906 on the date said law became operative, to-wit, September 27, 1906. Therefore, all such declarations, in the opinion of the bureau, will become invalid for naturalization purposes on and after September 27, 1913, and all petitions for naturalization based upon such old declarations on and after September 27, 1913, will be opposed by this office for the reasons stated. It is therefore suggested that when an applicant for citizenship calls upon you to file a petition that you advise him of the view of the bureau of naturalization, that he may decide whether to file a petition based upon such old declarations, or surrender the declaration and make a new one, which of course would mean a delay of two years before he could file a petition for citizenship based thereon.

"It must be understood that I am only giving you the views of the bureau of naturalization, and this question can only be decided authoritatively by the decision of the court in each individual case."

CONGRESSMAN BRYAN SUES SEATTLE PAPER FOR LIBEL

Asks Damages in the Sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars For Alleged Libelous Matter.

(By United Press Association) Seattle, Wash., Sept. 20.—A second suit for \$50,000 damages for alleged libel was today filed here by Congressman Bryan against the Seattle Times and the Times Printing company.

In the complaint it is alleged that the libel was committed in a recent attack made in the Times upon the plaintiff, following a speech by Bryan made in congress.

Among the alleged libelous remarks, according to the complaint filed, is a reference to the plaintiff in an editorial as "Reynolds Bryan." The one most contemptible and that even went unqualified in any community.

This is the second suit filed by Congressman Bryan against the Seattle paper and is an outgrowth of a feud between the Washington unit here and the Times, the latter having been very severe in its criticism of the public acts of the congressman.

Marsh was going through the city of Corvallis in company with a friend on another machine enroute to Salem. In the police court Marsh claimed his machine was broken off and promised to leave it fixed. The recorder ordered the man to leave the machine out of the city.

Runaway This Morning.—Frightened by an automobile in the course of Second and Perry streets, a big team hitched to an empty wagon dashed out Second street but was stopped at California before any damage was done.

GOVERNOR SULZER NEARLY BROKEN DOWN IN HEALTH

Important Witness For Defense Is Located in Buffalo. Says He Expected to Return.

(By United Press Association) Albany, N. Y., Sept. 20.—In spite of his statement to the contrary, Governor Sulzer is nearly a physical wreck. His close personal friends are worried over his condition in spite of his assertions that he is in good health. While a physician has not yet been summoned to the executive mansion, it is admitted that he is under the care of his wife.

After Sulzer's lawyers have exhausted every legal technicality in the impeachment trial it is claimed that the governor will appear in person before the court but if he does it will be against the advice of his lawyers.

Buffalo, Sep. 20.—Louis Sarecky, secretary to Governor Sulzer, who was expected to be one of Sulzer's best witnesses in the impeachment trial at Albany, but who disappeared from the capital the evening the case was called, has turned up here. He said he made a business trip to this city and has no intention of attempting to escape from the legislature's jurisdiction. He intends to return Monday to Albany.

Bridge Laborer Injured.—Clarence Ross, a youth of this city, employed with a crew of Southern Pacific workmen who are taking down some unused bridges on an abandoned section of the Woodburn-Natron branch of the road near Crabtree, was seriously injured yesterday when a timber struck him on the back of the head knocking him to the ground 14 feet below. The injured man was brought to this city on the Lebanon train and taken to the hospital.

ALL IN READINESS FOR GRAND KNIGHTS

Fully Three Hundred Will Be In Attendance at Grand Commandery Conclave.

THURSDAY, SEPT. 25 IS DATE OF MEETING

Seventeen Commanderies Will Be Represented--Big Parade Will Be Held.

All arrangements have been completed for the entertainment of Grand Commandery of Knights Templar on Thursday, September 25.

Bruce Commandery of Corvallis will be in attendance, with all of its members. Salem, Eugene and Portland will send large delegations and altogether 17 commanderies will be represented. It is expected that fully three hundred will be in attendance.

HANS SCHMIDT MAKES COMPLETE CHANGE OF FRONT

Asserts That District Attorney's Office Will Not Get Anything Out of Him.

(By United Press Association) New York, Sep. 20.—Changing front completely, Hans Schmidt astounded the authorities today by intimating he might fight to escape electrocution despite his declaration made yesterday to the effect that he is ready to die at any time. Conversing with his fellow prisoners, Schmidt asserted that "District Attorney Whitman will find himself up against a stone wall if he tries to get anything out of me."

Members of the health department suspect Schmidt may have used forged death certificates in other cases and are conducting an investigation. They believe that Anna Ammiller is not the only victim of the prisoner.
