Here are a few regnorests advanced ed by the friends of the Winkowst Compensation act:

Number One: A careful examination of the statistics of the twelve largest liability companies for the last two years obtainable, vis: 1910 and 1911, reveals the fact that only 43.9 per cent of the premiums paid went to

Number Two. This 43.9 per cent is paid gradgingly and every obstacle is placed in the way of an injured rkman seeking inst reileess. Usually the bursten is placed on him of taking the rich liability company into

Number Three: When the injured 4 W workman has paid the lawyer and other costs, it is a certainty that not more than half this 45.9 per cent is teft. In other words, probably not more than 20 percent of the total premiums is actually going for the relief of the injured.
