Morris, of Albany, were sentenced to six months each in the Multmonah county jail by United States District Judge R. S. Bean Tuesday afternoon at Portland The two were arrested in July by Secret Service Agent William Glover, after an investigation had disclosed their plant on Kiger's island in the William ten ear Corvallis.

Morris is just past 20 years old and Fouts has just attained his majority Because of these facts, Judge Bean explained that, in these two cases, he was breaking precedent by giving these men jail instead of penitentiary sentences. In the pleas of attorneys for the two men for leniency, they were seconded by United States Attorney Reames.
