

## HARRISBURG BRIDGE MATTER UP AGAIN

Delegation of Eight Agitators from Potato City Waited Upon Court Today.

INDICATIONS ARE NOT FAVORABLE FOR STRUCTURE

Linn Will Go Half with Lane But Will Not Promise to Build It Alone.

Continued from Wednesday, Nov. 12

That Harrisburg is not to get the bridge the people of that city have been asking for, was indicated this morning when another delegation of Potato City bridge agitators waited upon the county court.

Harrisburg came to bat his time with eight ardent bridge talkers. This was the third time that a delegation from that town has been before the court within the past two weeks on the same proposition.

After a conference that lasted nearly all the morning, the conclusion was reached by the members of the county court that bridge will not be built in Lane county. The Harrisburg people tried to get the county court to promise to construct the bridge regardless of the fact that the Lane county court would not assist, but the local court would not give any assurance.

This coupled with the fact that Lane county has refused flatly to go half in the construction of the bridge, leads to the belief that the bridge will not be constructed for some time at least.

Feasible reasons have been assigned by the Linn county court, mainly on points of taxation, to substantiate the contention that the bridge cannot be built at the present time.

The matter is left just where it was left off after the second meeting. The subject was first broached by a delegation of Harrisburg people, numbering over 100 men and women, who came here on November 4. After conferring with the Lane county court, and ascertaining its attitude, a second delegation waited upon the Linn county court a few days ago and today the final conference was held.

## ALBANY HIGH SCHOOL WALLOPS COLLEGE TEAM

As far as holding the line on both the defensive and offensive the college lads played good. The high school team's line was weak. Monteith and Briggs starred for the high school and Bruce, Gilbert and Hodge played a good game for the collegians.

## C. P. HENDERSON DIED AT HEPPNER YESTERDAY

Mr. O. P. Henderson, a prominent business man of Heppner, Oregon, formerly of Albany, died at his home Tuesday morning, November 11, after a lingering illness.

Funeral services were conducted at Heppner and the remains will be brought to Albany this evening for burial, which will take place in the City Cemetery tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock, under the auspices of the I. O. O. F. lodge.

Mr. Henderson leaves to mourn his death a wife, two sons and a daughter, two sisters and two brothers, and many relatives and friends in Albany.

Only Two Candidates in Race.—With the withdrawal of Fred P. Nutting from the mayoralty race, only one candidate is left in the race, nominated by petition, and he is L. M. Curl.

The only opposition Mr. Curl has is William Richards, who will run on the Socialist ticket. No other nomination can be made as the time limit of 25 days required for the filing of nominating petitions is up. The election is to be held on December 1.
