BETTER ROADS.

If there is any subject upon which the business men and farmers should be able to reach a unanimous agreement it is upon the subject of good roads for they both have a community of interest in bringing the farmer closer to his market.

Not until the county becomes a veritable net work of well built roads will the large farms be divided into smaller tracts. Smaller farms mean more settlers, more modern methods of farming, better prices for the land and a higher rate of interest on the investment than can now be obtained from agricultural property.

Linn county has spent a good deal of money for good roads but it has not spent enough. Better public highways pay a high rate of interest to every tax payer and the county court can make no better investment than in spending a larger sum for road the 20th day of October. Stamped on new era in road construction and improvement.

A GLORIOUS PICTURE.

"To what are we coming? The senate is to be steam-rolled by the president and the house and compelled to pass the currency bill they framed. ARE ON INSPECTION TOUR OF O.E. LINE

Colonel Clough, Board Chairman and George Slade Were Albany Visitors.

ARE INSPECTING VALLEY FROM WINDOW OF CAR

No Other Significance Attached to Trip; Conditions Are Good Says Colonel.

"The purpose of our trip through the valley is to look over the Willamette valley from the car window and get an idea of what it looks like and incidentally to inspect the Oregon Electric railway."

W. D. Skinner, publicity representative of the party of Northern Pacific railroad officials, who arrived here this noon on a special train over the Oregon Electric railway from Portland, gave out that statement shortly after their arrival at the Hammel Hotel where the party dined.

Members of the party are Colonel W. P. Clough of New York City, chairman of the board of directors of the Northern Pacific, George E. Slade, of St. Paul, first vice president; Thomas Cooper, of St. Paul, assistant to President Hannford; E. C. Blanchard, general manager; George T. Reed, and J. B. Richards, general superintendent, all of Tacoma; A. J. Davidson, L. Wickersham and W. D. Skinner, all of Portland and all high officials of the railroad company.

"We left Portland this morning at 8 o'clock," said Mr. Skinner, "and it was rather chilly but it has turned out to be a beautiful day and the members of our party are enjoying the trip immensely. We are making a hurry trip as we have got to cover a distance of 294 miles from Portland to Eugene and return by tonight.

Tomorrow we will make a trip over the United Railways out of Portland to Orenco and return. We are going to make similar trips over the company's lines in this state and Washington before the colonel and his party returns to the East. This is Colonel Clough's first trip through the valley and he is desirous of seeing as much as he can."

The special train on which the railroad men arrived in the city, reached the depot a few minutes after 12 o'clock. The party of nine walked to the Hammel, where they immediately went to the dining room for dinner. Shortly after 1 o'clock they departed for the depot and a little later were enroute to Eugene, where they will only remain for a short time before starting on the return trip.

The party was too much in a hurry to accept any courtesies from local people. A proffer of a short automobile ride through the main business district was declined.

Responding to a query, Colonel Clough said that he was only carrying out what was necessary to verify official of a railroad system in making the trip, that of inspecting the lines. Aside from this, he said, there is no other significance attached to the trip. It is the colonel's first trip over the road since becoming chairman of the board.

The party being in a hurry, Mr. Skinner lingered long enough to authorize statements made by Colonel Clough that he was glad to find conditions in the west good and that the Northern Pacific railroad was in splendid physical condition. Colonel Clough is quoted as saying that the country in general is prosperous but there is a shortage in capital available for loans but that this feature was rapidly adjusting itself.

The party arrived in Portland last night from Bend, after a tour of inspection in Eastern Oregon. The colonel and those accompanying him from St. Paul are conducting a thorough inspection of the road. They left St. Paul on November 6 and are hardly half through as yet, according to a statement accredited to the colonel. Parts of the road passed over in a hurry or at night will be inspected on the return trip.

Speaking of the climate of the Willamette valley, all members of the party spoke in the highest terms. It was the consensus of opinion of all that the day was most ideal and open opinions were to the effect that this is surely the sun kissed Willamette Valley.

Lee Bilyeu, a real estate man of Lebanon, was in the city yesterday attending business. He returned home this morning.

Albert L. Kullander, of Corvallis, formerly of this city, was in the city over night, stopping at the Hammel. He attended the session of the K. P. lodge last night.

E. E. Blanchard of Grants Pass, was in the city this morning on business. He will return home this evening.

"KING APPLE" IS TODAY REIGNING ALL OVER THE UNITED STATES

Event Initiated in Portland is Being Observed With Much Enthusiasm and by Many Civic Bodies.

All over the Union the apple today is exalted as the "king of fruits" for this is "apple day" proclaimed officially by Governor Oswald West, boosted by the Oregon Development League and chambers of commerce and commercial clubs throughout the land.

Almost every hotel in the state and all the larger hostilities of Washington and California have fallen in line with the idea originating in Portland. Besides reports have been received from hotels in far distant states that they will serve apples in every form, in fritters, as sauces to meats, as jellies, in pies, dumplings, as cider in soups, and even the homely apple-jack, solace of many a weary farmhand, is to be dignified into an appetizing cocktail. Portland's celebration took on quiet but general form. The Northern Pacific, sent forth a great motor truck fitted up like a dining car, from which colored waiters tossed thousands of apples to the face. Several civic clubs held special apple luncheons at which the apple was served and lauded in song and story.

The "apple day" idea originated with the idea of stimulating the popularity of the fruit all over the nation, incidentally widening the market of the Pacific Northwest.

Local hotels and restaurants are today serving special dishes made up of apples prepared in various ways. The stores have apples on special sale and everywhere is manifested the spirit of "apple day."
