MEXICAN REBELS ATTACK THE CITY OF OJINEGA

Federals Resist Attack But It Beleived That Town Will Be Captured.

(By United Press Association.)

Presido, Tex., Dec. 30.—Mexican rebels pressed the Ojinego garrison lard this morning and it seemed certain that they would take the town. The rank and file of its defenders are minimous. They wanted to surrender and their officers only made them fight under threats that they would kill them if they gave up the defense of the city. In fact they did kill a number of the federal soldiers. The rebel attack began last night and lasted three hours when they were finally repulsed. They slept on the field until daylight when the fighting was resumed. Many were filled in the attack. The number of federals in the garrison is believed to number four thousand and the rebels have about he same strength.
