

3 INTERESTING MEETINGS HELD

Enthusiastic Crowds Attended Under Auspices of Hygiene Society.

MUCH INTEREST WAS MANIFESTED BY THEM

Results Were Source of Much Gratification to Local Committee Men.

Three very interesting meetings were held in Albany last night, under the auspices of the local representatives of the Oregon Social Hygiene Society.

In East Albany, where Dr. Ellis spoke, the Grace Presbyterian church was crowded, it is estimated that there were one hundred or more present. The people expressed themselves as being very much interested and delighted over the meeting.

Much Interest Shown

In the Central school building, where Dr. Davis spoke, there were present about an equal number, the assembly room being nearly filled. Great interest was taken in the subject, and many asked questions and expressed their approval of the movement.

In West Albany, where Dr. Robnett spoke, in the Mennonite church, there were one hundred and one present by actual count, some coming from the country. The address was enthusiastically received, and a desire was expressed by many that another meeting of a similar character would be held before long.

Very Gratifying.

It is very gratifying to know that the people throughout the country are beginning to appreciate the importance of having proper instructions on sex life. Heretofore it has been considered improper to discuss this matter in public, and a certain false modesty has kept people from speaking openly. Why should the young people not be informed on the most vital and important functions of their life? The people of Albany are certainly to be congratulated upon the deep interest which they manifested in the public gatherings last night, and it is hoped that a number of similar meetings will be held before the winter is over, and that each parent will be made to realize the importance of the subject.

DAVID J. KING, AT 85, IS CALLED BY DEATH

Was Veteran of the Civil War and Was Well Known in Albany.

David J. King died this noon at the family home on East Sixth street, after a short illness, at the age of 85.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence. The services will be conducted by Rev. W. L. of Salem. Interment will be in the city cemetery. The local G. A. R. post members will have charge of the services at the cemetery.

David J. King was born in 1829. He is survived by a wife and several children. He is the father of Officer Griff King, of the local police force. The deceased served during the Civil War and according to his comrades, was a brave and fearless soldier. He was well and favorably known in Albany and Linn county, having made his home here for years.

TWO GREEKS ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF LARCENY

Brought to Albany and Bound Over for Grand Jury Action.

Charged with larceny from a dwelling, two Greeks were arrested yesterday at Shelburn by Constable Catlin and brought to Albany.

Arraigned before Justice Swan this morning, they waived examination and were bound over to await the action of the grand jury. Their bonds were fixed at \$150 each. One furnished his bond and the other went to jail.

Worked on Section.

The names given by the two foreigners are George Cranaty and John Marrs. The former put up a cash bail but the latter is held in the county jail by default of bonds. Both were employed with a section gang working on the Corvallis & Eastern railroad near Shelburn.

Constable Catlin made the arrest yesterday afternoon, on complaint of a resident of Shelburn. He returned with his prisoners last night and they were confined overnight in the county jail. Cranaty, it is reported, left this morning, immediately upon his release for Shelburn.

LINN COUNTY PIONEER DIED AT WALLA WALLA

Samuel M. Kees Who Settled Here in 1848 Victim of Blood Poisoning.

Word was received in Albany today of the death at Walla Walla, of an old Linn county pioneer, Samuel M. Kees, 78 years old, who settled in the Northwest in 1848. The cause of death was blood poisoning.

Mr. Kees was born in Illinois, February 21, 1836. He went to Lebanon, Linn county, Or., with his parents in 1848, crossing the plains with an ox-team. In 1861 he came to Walla Walla with a herd of cattle and settled on a farm near here. For 20 years he lived in town, though he retained ownership of the farm.

He leaves his wife and two children, A. E. Kees, ex-warden of the state prison here, and Mrs. Lillian Julian, both of Walla Walla.

BAILIFF, ONCE LINN COUNTY SHERIFF HAS BIRTHDAY

George Humphrey Celebrated 81st Birthday in Portland Yesterday.

George Humphrey, a former deputy sheriff and sheriff of Linn county twenty-one years ago, but now crier and bailiff of the United States district court, was 81 years old yesterday and celebrated the event in Portland. He has not missed a day's work since his last birthday, and said that he felt as well as the day he became a deputy United States marshal, 21 years ago.

Last year "Uncle George," as he is known to everyone who is connected with the federal court, remained on duty all day on his birthday, but yesterday, court not being in session, he spent the greater portion of the day at home.

That "Uncle George" be retained as bailiff was one of the requests made by Clarence L. Reames when he took the office of United States District attorney last spring.

Mr. Humphrey is well and favorably known in Albany and Linn county. He is an uncle of C. H. Stewart of Albany and the father of Edgar G. W. Humphrey, of the Jefferson Review.

RIVER EXPECTED TO REACH 20 FOOT STAGE TOMORROW

Since yesterday morning at 8 o'clock, the river has come up 2.2 feet and as a result of the heavy rains last night is expected to reach the 20 foot stage by tomorrow. This morning the stage was 16.4 feet. The rainfall for 24 hours ending at 8 o'clock this morning was 1.39 inches, being nearly a record for the year. The record is 1.87 inches of rain in 24 hours during this winter, this amount having fallen during one day the fore part of the month.

STATE SHOOT MAY BE HELD HERE

ASSOCIATION BOARD TO DECIDE TONIGHT

Albany Man On Board.

Ballack, of this city, a leading member of the Albany gun club, who went to Portland today to attend the meeting of the associations board, of which he is a member. Mr. Ballack will present the invitation of the local sportsmen before the board and it is believed that Albany stands a good chance of securing the shoot.

Will Be Big Event.

Last year's shoot was held in Eugene. It is a big event of the year and is characterized by state wide interest. The members of the local club are unanimous in their desire to secure it for Albany this year and the prompt action taken by them last night indicates their enterprise. The exact date in June when the shoot is to be held will be decided by the board tonight.
