

# GREAT LANDSLIDE FOR DEMOCRATS

Wilson Carried Thirty Eight States--Will Get 412 Electoral Votes.

TAFT IS POOR 3rd; ROOSEVELT GETS 99 ELECTORAL VOTES

Lane Leads for U. S. Senator; Suffrage Apparently Carried; Single Tax Defeated.

From Wednesday, November 6.

(Special to Evening Democrat) Portland, Ore., Nov. 6.—Carrying thirty-eight states, giving him a total of 412 votes in the electoral college, Woodrow Wilson, democratic nominee for President, yesterday won the most complete victory in the history of the American nation.

Not only did the democratic nominee carry the solid south, but will receive more than twice as many votes in the electoral college as Roosevelt and Taft combined.

On the face of the returns received up to 2 p. m. today Roosevelt will receive 99 votes in the electoral college and Taft 20.

In many states, including the great state of New York, the democrats elected their governor and the majority of the members of the state legislature, insuring the election of democratic senators in the place of the republican incumbents.

The estimated plurality of Wilson in Oregon is placed between five and ten thousand votes.

Returns received thus far indicate that woman suffrage has carried and that the single tax has been overwhelmingly defeated.

Harry Lane is leading in the senatorial race in Oregon.

## WILSON AND HARRY LANE SWEEP LINN COUNTY

With final results from 22 out of 34 precincts in Linn county available (exclusive of Albany) Woodrow Wilson has a lead of 531 votes over Roosevelt, his nearest opponent, and 570 over Taft.

Dr. Harry Lane has a lead of 325 votes over Selling and 805 over Bourne, the latter receiving only 323 votes in the precincts above reported.

For congress Hawley, republican, and Smith, democrat, are running neck and neck, the former being 32 votes ahead of Smith. Campbell is a poor third.

Jackson, democrat, appears to have the largest majority of any of the county candidates, returns available at this time giving him a lead of 653 votes over his republican opponents.

All other republican candidates have a lead over the democrats and returns thus far received indicate that Jackson will be the only county candidate on the democratic ticket who will be elected. The fight for the legislative offices is close and new returns may change the result.

## PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION DECIDED BY ALBANY HIGH

Irrespective of which way the battle of ballots goes today, the great majority of students in the Albany High school favor the election of Woodrow Wilson. A straw vote was taken yesterday which gave Wilson a clear majority over both Taft and Roosevelt. The result was as follows: Wilson, 90; Roosevelt, 51; Taft, 32; Debs, 18; and Chafin, 6.

Following is a resume in a nutshell of returns from various states:

Arizona—Wilson has good lead; woman suffrage appears to have carried state.

Arkansas—Wilson carries state by 60,000.

California—Wilson leads and his manager claims state by 20,000.

Colorado—Reports indicate Wilson will carry state by 42,000 over Taft, with Roosevelt close third.

Connecticut—Wilson carries state.

Delaware—Wilson carries Delaware by good plurality.

Florida—Usual democratic majorities.

Georgia—Usual democratic majorities.

Idaho—Wilson leads on early returns.

Illinois—Roosevelt carries state by 15,000, Wilson second. Democrats elect governor.

Indiana—Democratic with Roosevelt apparently second.

Iowa—Seems to have been carried by Roosevelt; Wilson second.

Kansas—Roosevelt leads on early returns.

Kentucky—Carried by Wilson. No state candidates voted on.

Louisiana—Usual democratic majorities.

Maine—Success of democratic electoral ticket apparent from three fourths count; Wilson having 5000 lead over Roosevelt.

Maryland—Democratic by about 40,000.

Massachusetts—State democratic for president, first time in its history. Governor Foss re-elected. Democrats seem to have made slight gain in congress.

Michigan—Scattering and incomplete returns indicate Roosevelt has a good plurality.

Minnesota—Democrats claim state on early returns by 25,000.

Mississippi—Democratic majority indicated as 105,000.

Missouri—Scattering returns indicate Wilson has carried state.

Montana—Apparently democratic.

Nebraska—Senator Hitchcock claims state for Wilson by 35,000.

Nevada—Returns give Wilson a good lead. Roosevelt second.

New Hampshire—Taft has slight lead.

New Jersey—Wilson carries New Jersey by a safe plurality. The count is slow.

New Mexico—No returns as yet.

New York—For Wilson by 150,000 to 200,000.

North Carolina—Democratic, usual majorities.

North Dakota—Wilson leads strongly. Republican candidate for governor leads.

Ohio—Wilson leads in Ohio.

Oklahoma—Wilson has large majority.

Oregon—Long ballot makes returns extremely slow.

Pennsylvania—In doubt at a late hour.

Rhode Island—Taft leads on meager returns.

South Carolina—Democratic electors elected by usual majorities. Roosevelt electors seem to be second.

South Dakota—Wilson leads, with Roosevelt a close second.

Tennessee—Usual democratic majorities.

Texas—Democratic by 170,000.

Utah—Seems to have been carried by President Taft.

Vermont—Taft wins by 924 votes over Roosevelt on final count. Wilson third.

Virginia—Democratic.

Washington—Polls closed late. Slow count makes returns late.

West Virginia—Wilson leads on meager returns.

Wisconsin—State goes into Wilson column.

Wyoming—Taft leads on meager returns. Mondell, representative for congress, has large lead.

## "UNCLE JOE" CANNON CAUGHT IN LANDSLIDE

## DEMOCRATS WIN CONTROL IN SENATE

Returns Indicate Majority of Four With Eight in Doubtful Column.

BORAH, PROGRESSIVE CANDIDATE WINS THE RACE

Contest in Kansas and Colorado Is Close--Senator Dixon May Be Defeated.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—The next United States senate will be democratic by a majority of at least four. According to returns from all sections of the country there will be 46 democrats in the upper house of congress and 42 republicans. This leaves eight seats in the doubtful column, with every prospect of their being swung into the democratic ranks.

Senator Smith, of Michigan, also showed signs of being defeated, according to early returns from that state. These returns, mostly from Detroit and surrounding towns, show that Wilson is leading there.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, progressive and republican candidate, will probably be returned to the senate, in Colorado, where a successor to Senator Guion Phelan is being chosen, early returns show the race to be close between the democrats and republicans.

Senator Joseph M. Dixon, of Montana, Colonel Roosevelt's campaign manager, is having a hard time being returned. It is said that he sacrificed his own chances by being loyal to the Colonel. In Massachusetts it was still within the realm of possibility, last night, that Senator Crane would have to give place to either Mayor Fitzgerald, of Boston, or Governor Boss.

With returns from practically every section of the state showing a steady increase in Wilson's plurality, it was claimed at democratic headquarters shortly before midnight that Illinois will send two democrats to the United States senate. The legislature, it is claimed, will be overwhelmingly democratic, with the possibility of a few progressives. So certain were the democratic chiefs of controlling the legislature that they already have tacitly agreed upon denouncing to elect Charles Borchers, democratic national committee man from Illinois, to fill the place made vacant by the expulsion of Senator Lorimer. Colonel James Hamilton Lewis, the regular democratic candidate for the senate, who was endorsed at the last primaries, will be elected in all probability to the six-year term to fill the place of Shelby M. Cullom. Mr. Borchers, in the event he is chosen, will have but two years to serve, as ex-Senator Lorimer's term expires in 1915.

In Kansas, where Governor Stubbs, progressive, is battling with Senator Curtis, standpat republican, it was indicated at a late hour that both might be defeated and the state go democratic. In event of this there may be a democratic senator from the state elected as a colleague of Senator Bristow.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, probably will be returned, as perhaps will Senator William Alden Smith, of Michigan, although late returns from Michigan showed that it is possible that the next Michigan legislature will be democratic, in which event Senator Smith will be relegated to the back-ground.

In Tennessee the legislature will be democratic, as it will in probably all of the southern states, thus insuring a solid delegation of United States senators to assist in carrying through the Wilson ideas.

## ALBANY BRAKEMAN LOSES RIGHT FOOT

Paul Rex Meets With Accident While Switching in Yards at Corvallis.

FOOT BADLY MASHED WHILE MAKING A COUPLING

Mishap Occured Within Twenty Feet of Where M. S. Darby Was Killed Recently.

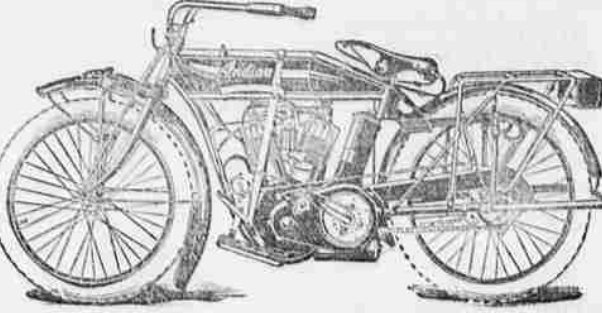
Paul Rex of this city who is employed by the Corvallis & Eastern Railway as a brakeman on Conductor Riley's train, between Albany and Corvallis, met with an unfortunate accident while switching in the yards at Corvallis yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, which resulted in him losing his right foot.

Rex was riding on the pilot of the engine of his train which was moving slowly toward a car of fruit standing on the siding and to which the engine was to be coupled. As the engine approached the car, Rex noticed that the coupling was not open and he attempted to kick it open with his foot. He was unable to withdraw his foot before it was caught between the two couplers and nearly mashed off.

He was rushed to the Corvallis hospital where he was attended by Dr. Pennoth who after examining the foot, decided that it was necessary to amputate it about six inches above the ankle. The operation was successfully performed and the patient was said to be resting easy today.

The rear wheel can go through almost any vertical motion without affecting the body of the machine. There is no "bottom" to this spring device. The life of the machine is greatly increased.

The Engineering Department of the Hendee Mfg. Co. devoted 18 months of exhaustive test to the Cradle Spring Frame before finally deciding on its adoption for all models of the 1913 Indian.

In addition to the Cradle Spring Frame, the 1913 Indian embodies 10 other important improvements which will be appreciated by motorcycle riders in general. Prices remain the same as last year.

New Style, single clinch rims; larger 1 1/2" wider mud guards front and rear with larger splashers; casing for upper stretch of transmission chains and curve of sprocket; larger luggage carrier in rear, fitted to all models; foot rests, as well as pedals, fitted to regular 4 h. p. and 7 h. p. models; foot brake lever fitted on left side now operates hand brake as well as the pedal action; larger size multiple disc clutch now fitted to all models; improved Indian type saddle.

All 1913 Indians will be chain driven and finished in Indian red only.
