

MARION FAILS TO APPOINT MEMBER

Meeting of Arbitration Board to Settle Bounudry Dispute Is Called Off.

JUDGE HARRIS OF EUGENE WAS NOTIFIED TODAY

Matter Will Now Be Thrashed Out During Present Session of Legislature.

Continued from Saturday, January 25.

Failing to select a member of the arbitration board which was expected to dispose of the division line dispute between Linn and Marion counties, Judge Bushey of Salem today notified County Judge McKnight of the inability of the Marion county delegation to agree upon the choice of a member and the entire matter will now be thrashed out during the present session of the state legislature.

Linn county had selected Judge Harris of Eugene as its representative on the board and he was to meet with the other members at Salem today for the purpose of disposing of the matter. Judge McKnight wired him this morning that the meeting had been cancelled at the request of Marion county.

When asked this morning in regard to the matter, Judge McKnight stated that in the event of the passage of a bill which does not meet with the approval of Linn county, the entire matter will be taken to the supreme court for final adjudication. He does not expect the Carson bill to pass during the present session.

BURGLARS WORKING IN MANY OREGON TOWNS AT PRESENT

Albany Is Not the Only Town That Is Being Robbed Says Chief Austin.

That Albany is not the only town in the state that is experiencing an other petty crimes is indicated by the fact that Chief of Police Austin of this city receives letter and telegrams every day telling of stores and homes being robbed in towns and cities throughout the state.

From Eastern Oregon to Southern Oregon, these burglaries have been occurring for several weeks and the police of the entire valley are working overtime in an endeavor to check them and to apprehend the thieves. Portland, Oregon City, Salem, Albany, Eugene, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, and many other towns in the state are especially bothered with burglars.

Sheriff Parker of Lane county says that robberies are being committed in Eugene on the best lighted streets of the city and that the thieves have been working systematically in that city for several weeks. Sheriff Taylor of Union county has notified the police of the various Oregon cities to watch for the men who recently robbed the Fair store at Milton.

ESCAPED PATIENT OF INSANE ASYLUM CAUGHT AT SHELBURN

He Stated That He Was Buying Horses for General Passenger Agent John M. Scott.

Jacob Arent, who has been an inmate of the state insane asylum for several months, managed to escape last Saturday while the three hundred patients were being placed aboard the special train that was to carry them to the Eastern Oregon asylum at Pendleton, and after a long cross-country hike reached Shelburn where he was taken into custody by residents of that city who notified Sheriff Bodine that he was there.

Sheriff Bodine instructed his deputy at that place, M. J. Lindley, to bring the patient to this city, which he did, arriving here yesterday afternoon. He was taken back to Salem on the evening train by an attendant of the institution who came after him. While waiting for the electric train at this city, Arent volunteered the information that he was buying horses for John M. Scott, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific.

George H. Coshaw, a resident of Brownsboro, was brought to Albany this morning by Deputy Sheriff John Wolfe and after an examination by Dr. Davis and Judge McKnight was committed to the asylum to which institution he was taken by an attendant of the asylum this afternoon.

A LEBANON WORKMAN UNEARTHED HUMAN FOOT

Sent to J. G. Crawford of This City for Inspection; Will Then Go to Portland.

While working upon the line of the Lebanon Electric Light Co., Mr. Bert Murphy unearthed, what he at first thought was a plaster cast, but further investigation proved it to be a petrified human foot. It was sent to J. G. Crawford of Albany for diagnosis, says the Express.

Upon examination, the possessor was thought to have lived in Philocephal epoch, of the Psychozoic era, in the geological formation of the western hemisphere.

The shape and size indicate that the "ancient" was a woman or child, which is thought to be one of a tribe of "Clam Diggers," which are supposed to have inhabited these regions when the coast was far inland. The foot had five and one-half toes, a short projection upon the side of the great toe, has very much the same shape as a present human foot otherwise a little flatter.

The relic is on exhibition at the company's office. Mr. Murphy promises to present the specimen to the city museum of Portland.

PRESBYTERIANS INDORSE ANTI-SALOON LEGISLATION

Passed Important Resolutions at Regular Service Held Yesterday Morning.

The Sabbath morning congregation of the First Presbyterian church yesterday morning passed a resolution heartily endorsing the legislation desired by the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon and urges the legislators and senators representing Linn county to support the same, namely:

House bill No. 49, providing for the abatement by injunction of houses of ill-fame. House bill No. 124, and Senate bill No. 84, prohibiting the issuance of saloon licenses outside of municipalities. Senate bill No. 34, prohibiting saloons within 300 feet of depots, etc. Senate bill No. 49, relating to the sale of soft drinks at or near fair grounds. Senate bill No. 64, prohibiting the shipment of liquor into dry territory.

MINING CONTEST CASE BEING TRIED HERE TODAY

Witnesses Here and Testimony Being Taken Before County Clerk Marks.

ALBANY DRAYMAN IS BADLY INJURED

Electric Train Smashes into a Dray Near Fifth and Main Sts. on Saturday Evening.

W. L. WOODS HAS HIS SKULL FRACTURED IN ACCIDENT

Frightened Team Backed Dray Upon Track in Front of the Approaching Train.

William L. Wood, a well known resident of this city and a teamster employed by the E. R. Cummings Transfer company, lies in a critical condition at his home at 823 South Thurston street today as the result of injuries which he received Saturday evening when he was thrown from his dray, which was struck by an incoming electric passenger train on East Fifth street between Hill and Main streets.

Wood was driving east on the left-hand side of the street, according to Mrs. C. A. Matthews of 1043 East Fifth street, an eye witness to the accident, and in front of whose residence the accident occurred. As the electric train approached, the horses became frightened and started to run away. Woods exerted every effort to control the team and was partially successful, but the team finally started to back up and backed the dray across the track, where it was immediately struck by the train.

The impact threw the wagon, which was loaded with wood, against the curb and Wood, the driver, was thrown over the dashboard of the dray and struck the pavement on his head. He was rendered unconscious and the heavy vehicle passed over his body, for the horses had started to run away again.

The team ran to the corner of First and Main streets where the tongue of the dray struck a telephone pole and was broken off short.

By this time the electric train had been brought to a stop and the passengers flocked to the assistance of the unconscious teamster who was lying upon the pavement where he had been thrown when the train struck the dray.

Woods was placed aboard the train and brought to the Oregon Electric depot where a conveyance was in waiting and was immediately taken to his home on Thurston street.

Dr. Shinn, the Oregon Electric physician at this city, attended the man and after an examination found that his injuries consisted of a fractured skull, a badly bruised right shoulder, and several minor cuts and bruises.

When Dr. Shinn was interviewed by the Democrat representative this morning he said that the indications were favorable for Wood and that unless serious complications set in as a result of his injuries, the chances for his recovery were good. However, it will be several days before it will be known definitely just how bad Wood is injured.

Wood was starting for the eastern end of the city to deliver a load of fir wood when the team became frightened at the approach of the train and backed onto the track, just in time to be struck by the cars. The train which struck the dray was the evening local due here at 5:20 o'clock and was in charge of Conductor Ryan and Motorman Shumway. The dray belongs to E. R. Cummings, the local transfer man, in whose employ Woods has been for some months.

The first intimation of the accident that the passengers on the train had occurred when the motorman sounded his whistle several times in rapid succession and the train came to a sudden stop. The passengers on the train assisted the trainmen in every way possible, helping unhitch the frightened team and placing the unconscious drayman aboard the train.

After being taken home, the injured man was placed in bed and never recovered consciousness until yesterday morning. He has only been conscious for short intervals since that time and according to Mrs. Wood who was seen yesterday afternoon by the Democrat representative, spent a restless night Saturday. Besides his wife, Wood has several small children. Visitors are being denied admittance to the sick-room and the patient is being kept absolutely quiet.

The only damage done to the dray was the smashing of the rear wheel on the right side of the vehicle which was struck by the cars and the breaking of the tongue of the dray which was caused by the collision with the telephone pole. The horses escaped injury.

Many versions of the accident have been given and no two were alike, but the story of Mrs. C. A. Matthews of 1043 East Fifth street is probably the most authentic one for she was sewing near the front window of her residence and the accident occurred directly in front of her house. She attributes the cause of the accident to the frightened team which backed the dray across the track. This is the first serious accident within the city limits on the Oregon Electric since it was completed last July.
