Notice is hereby given that in pursuance with the act of Congress approved May 10, 1872, the Columbia Gold Mining Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the state of Oregon, whose post office is Sumpter, Baker County, Oregon, has made application for a patent for the Cyclone Consolidated quartz claim, situated in no organized mining district, in Baker County, State of Oregon, including the Cyclone and Protection quartz claims, and described by the official plat herewith posted and by the field notes on file in the office of the Register of La Grande land district, State of Oregon, as follows, with magnetic variation at 20 degrees 35 minutes east, viz:

Description of the Cyclone Consolidated Quartz Claim (consisting of the Cyclone and Protection quartz claims). Mineral survey No. 366, to wit:

Beginning at a post marked "Cor. No. 1 366," which is 271 degrees 45 minutes 277 feet from U. S.
