ORE FOR THE SMELTER.

Ten Tons From Quartzburg, 100 From East of Baker.

Sam H. Hayes came in from Prairie City last Thursday with ten tons of ore; the first installment of a lot to the smelter from the Quartzburg district, taken from the Oregon-Colorado mines, of which he has recently come into possession.

Mr. Hayes has a ten-stamp mill on the way here to be hauled to the same district, where he will have it erected on the Don Sancho claim, another recent acquisition that has great merit and from which many thousands of dollars has already been "gophered," but under Mr. Hayes' direction will likely be made a mine of as soon as men, money and brains can perform such service.

Several tons of sacked ore from Houser's Standard mine in the same district were also received last week, and more will follow at once.

Over 100 tons from Baker City will arrive this week, so that the outlook for early operations at the smelter is good.

Just why the ore producers are so slow in bringing in their mine production is a mystery, unless they are like the man from Missouri who "wanted to be shown."

The financial transaction of all matters pertaining to treatment of ores by the smelter people is done through the First Bank of Sumpter, and all money is paid out by the bank, so that any one owning ores to be treated by the smelter people can go there and draw same at their pleasure, as soon as their ore values have been attained.

Horses Shipped From Grant to St. Paul.
Engemoen Bros., of St. Paul, received over 100 head of horses from the horse

owners in this part of Grant county last Monday and Tuesday, which were driven to Heppner for shipment to St. Paul. The average price paid was from \$7 to 9 per head. Of this band C. S. Dustin turned in about 70 head and John Elliott about 40. The buyers were desirous of securing at least 1000 head, but the short time allowed the horse owners to gather the animals from the range accounts for so small a bunch being turned off. These gentlemen also received quite a band of J. R. Brown, of Cottonwood.—Long Creek Eagle.

Mill For the Red Boy Hill.

The most flattering reports are being received at the office in this city of the Red Boy Hill Gold Mining company, owning a group of claims closely adjoining the well known Red Boy mine. Tunnel No. 1 is nearly 100 feet on a crosscut to cut the ledge that shows on the surface to be 60 feet in width. The tunnel is in ore, the vein showing a width wider than the tunnel, which is 6x8 feet. The ore runs from \$12.40 to \$14.35 to the ton. There is ore enough in sight to keep a ten-stamp mill running for years and the company is now perfecting its plans to erect a mill of this size in the very near future.—Baker City Democrat.
