

DIADEM IS A SHIPPER.

**Ore is Worth More Than
\$5000 a Car Load.**

The first lot of ore from the Diadem arrived in Sumpter Monday. It consisted of two tons. That amount will arrive daily until a car load is received, when it will be shipped to a smelter for reduction. Messrs. Warren and Pardee have not yet decided whether it will be sent to Northport, Tacoma or Omaha.

This is sorted rock, and will be worth about \$5000 in gold, besides about five per cent in copper and considerable lead. There is enough ore of this character on the dump to continue shipments for a month. A good wagon road has been constructed to the mine and hauling is now not a difficult matter.

Messrs. Warren and Pardee were out to the mine last week and returned much elated over the outlook. The men employed there have been stoping for a week or ten days past. Three car loads of ore have been sacked, ready for shipment. While the shaft is only 86 feet deep, and with a 48-foot drift on the vein, it now shows more values proportionally than almost any prospect in eastern Oregon. This vein has been traced 1000 feet below the original workings of the Diadem proper. A tunnel has been run in on the vein to tap the ledge about 1000 feet below the apex of the mountain.

Work Commenced on Brick Blocks.

David Wilson was in town last week, and he finally completed arrangements for erecting those brick blocks on south Mill street. The first to be erected will be the townsite company's office. This will be a one story brick, 37 by 50 feet, containing two rooms, with a handsome front and plate glass along one side of the building. Stone for the foundation is now being delivered. Contractor Daniels, who is in charge of the work, thinks he can have the roof on in thirty days. The deal was also closed with Mr. Wilson whereby he takes possession of the brick yard formerly operated by C. Y. Burn. Immediately on his return from Ontario he will start operations there and burn as many brick as possible this season, which he will put into brick blocks of his own.

The half way house of C. H. Barnard on the Bourne road is a well conducted, respectable place where ladies or gentlemen can stop for ice cold refreshments and lunches.

ORDINANCE NO. 13. (New Series.)

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE OFFICE OF CITY ATTORNEY, AND DEFINING HIS DUTIES AND FIXING HIS COMPENSATION.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Sumpter:

SECTION 1. The office of City Attorney of the Town of Sumpter is hereby created.

SECTION 2. The City Attorney shall be elected at the first regular meeting of the Common Council after their election or at any meeting thereafter, and such City Attorney shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council.

SECTION 3. The salary of the City Attorney shall be Fifty Dollars, payable monthly, which salary shall be paid by warrants drawn upon the Treasurer of the town of Sumpter.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the City Attorney to attend to all actions, suits or proceedings in which the Town of Sumpter is interested as a party, and attend to the prosecution of all persons charged with the violation of a town ordinance; he shall prepare for execution all instruments to which the town of Sumpter is a party, and he shall give his advice concerning any matter in which the town of Sumpter is interested as a party, when requested in writing so to do by the mayor, common council or any committee of the common council.

ORDINANCE NO. 14. (New Series.)

AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING THE EAST ONE HUNDRED FEET OF THE ALLEY IN BLOCK TWO, RIVERSIDE ADDITION TO SUMPTER, FOR MUNICIPAL BUILDING PURPOSES.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Sumpter:

SECTION 1. That the easterly one hundred (100) feet of the alley in Block Two (2) in Riverside Addition to the Town of Sumpter, be and the same is hereby appropriated by the said Town of Sumpter for the purpose of erecting thereon buildings for the use of said Town of Sumpter.

ORDINANCE NO. 15. (New Series.)

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A PUBLIC DUMPING GROUND.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Sumpter:

SECTION 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to deposit or cause to be deposited, any rubbish, refuse or waste of any kind, in any alley, road, street or other land owned by or under the control of the Town of Sumpter, except upon such land as the council may designate as a public dumping ground.

SECTION 2. Any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$50, or shall be imprisoned in the town jail not less than 3 days nor more than 30 days.
