SUMPTER FREE GOLD COMPANY.

Officers at Ours and Two Annual Meetings Held the Same Day.

Two meetings of the Sumpter Free Gold Mining company were called for Wednesday. At one Secretary Charles F. Stuart was the solitary attendant and at the other four members of the board of trustees were present and conducted the regular business of the meeting. Why two meetings were called and what the trouble is between Secretary Stuart and his colleagues was not obtainable. According to the statement of Mr. Stuart he had enough proxies to have controlled the meeting of the other trustees but he did not attend. Mr. Stuart as secretary issued a call for the annual meeting at one place for 10 o'clock Wednesday morning. He was there with the books and records, but no one appeared. The real meeting took place at another place in the evening. Mr. Stuart made the following statement:

"J. W. Higgins and M. E. Gallemore, of Colfax, both members of the board, are in town. I asked them if they were coming to the meeting and they said no, that they had a meeting of their own in the Jamieson block. I could attend the meeting and block everything they attempt to do for I hold proxies for about 300,000 shares of stock, which is more than they control, but I will not. About a month ago Mr. Gallemore asked me to issue the call for this meeting. I did so, putting the company seal on the notice. The next day Higgins called and asked to borrow the seal. I asked him why he wanted it and he said he wanted to issue a call for the annual meeting. I asked him when he had been elected secretary; told him I had issued the call and that if he would bring the papers down I would look at them and perhaps put the seal upon them. I suppose he issued the call

for the meeting they are holding tonight."

Mr. Stuart declared this meeting was not legal and would not be recognized and that he would return to Colfax today and endeavor to have another meeting later.

The following directors were elected at last night's meeting: M. E. Gallemore and J. W. Higgins, of Colfax, P. E. Hayes, of Spokane, F. R. Rowlee and H. J. Stafford, of Sumpter, Or. The new board elected the following officers for the ensuing year: M. E. Gallemore, of Colfax, president; J. E. Hayes, of Spokane, vice-president; J. W. Higgins, of Colfax, secretary; J. W. Jesse, of Dayton, treasurer.

This company owns six claims on the IbeX road in Sumpter camp, Oregon, and has done considerable work since acquiring the property about a year ago. A tunnel has been driven 165 feet on one of the several leads on the property and there are a number of open cuts. A blacksmith shop, bunk house and other buildings have been erected and a force of men is at work on the property. The ore is free gold. The company is capitalized at 1,500,000 shares of a par value of five cents.—Spokesman Review.

Shaw Lumber Co. Will Resume Operations.

S. H. Bloomer, one of the owners of the A. C. Shaw Lumber company, whose mill is south of town, is here arranging to begin operations again. The plant has only been shut down a short time, and will likely be running again in a few days. That there will be a good demand for lumber here this fall there is little doubt, as several buildings are contemplated and it is certain that considerable lumber will be hauled into the hills to build comfortable quarters for miners, who at present are living in tents.
