FOREST FIRE LAW.

Text of the Statute Prescribing Penalties for Setting Woods Afire.

Game and Forestry Warden Quimby is sending out copies of the forest fire law, as follows:

"Any person maliciously kindling a fire on his own or other land, which shall injure the personal property or wooded timber lands of any other person, shall be punished by a fine not less than \$20 nor more than \$100, or by imprisonment not less than three months nor more than twelve months.

"Kindling a fire without malice on any land without consent of the owner, which shall spread and damage any property or wood or timber land not his own, not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 and costs.

"Entering upon lands of another person for the purpose of hunting or fishing, and without the consent of the owner, kindling any fire thereon, not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

"If kindled maliciously, not less than \$20 nor more than \$250, or by imprisonment not less than three months, nor more than twelve months.

"Willfully setting fire to any wooded country or forest, not more than \$1000 or imprisonment not exceeding one year or both.

"Section 21. The said game and forestry warden, or any sheriff, deputy sheriff or constable, may without warrant arrest any person violating any of the statutes now or hereafter enacted and in force at the time, for the protection of game, game birds, song birds and forests, or any of them, and take such person before any court having jurisdiction, who shall proceed without delay to hear, try and determine the matter, and give and enter judgment according to the allegations and proofs."

Nome Paper on the Situation There.

There is no doubt that the situation is serious enough, and it promises to grow

worse, of course, with the passing of time. The question naturally arises, what shall be done with the great number of men who are unable to obtain employment and who being "broke," are unable to leave the country? It is a serious question, indeed, and one that demands immediate attention. The News has referred to it before, believing it to be of vital importance to this community. This community cannot take care of the great number of indigent, neither can it purchase transportation to the outside for them at current rates. It is, therefore, up to the transportation companies and the government. The former might give a low rate and the latter could guarantee the payment. In this way the situation would be relieved, as many men who are only too anxious to return to their former homes would be able to do so. It is no use to moralize over conditions. The only way is to face them as promptly as possible when they arise. We are up against a very unpleasant and menacing situation. It must be met. These people must be gotten out of the country before navigation closes. The Chamber of Commerce has outlined the action it will take. The government will be asked to afford transportation, and this seems to be the only practicable solution of a bad case. And the solution is repugnant to any man of independent spirit. But "spirit" does not count in cases like these. It is the duty of the government to see that these unfortunates, who are unable to leave the country by reason of lack of means, be given free transportation out of the country.—Editorial in Nome Daily News, July 28.
