LATEST press dispatches state, relative to the hurricane horror at Galveston, that Mayor Walter C. Jones estimates the number of dead at 5000 and he is conservative. Over 2300 bodies have been taken to the sea or buried in trenches. Other hundreds are yet to be taken from the ruins. These bodies are now all badly decomposed and they are being buried in trenches where they are found. Others are being buried in debris where it can be safely done. There is little attempt at identification and it is safe to say that there will never be a complete list of the

Chief of Police Ketchum is in charge of the work of burying the dead. There are large bodies of men engaged in this work, tearing up ruins and getting out corpses. Several persons have already been shot, it is reported. A soldier of Rafferty's batmorning ordered a man to desist from looting. The fellow drew a weapon and was attacked by three other men and he killed all of them. He had five cartridges in his rifle and each of them found a victim. It is probable that twenty-five in all have been shot. Some of these were shot for failing to halt when ordered to do so. Others were shot for vandalism. No accurate estimate has yet been made regarding loss to property.


