WORLD'S GO D PRODUCT.

During Past Pifty Years Nearly Seven Billions of Dollars.

Few people resilize how much the world's production of gold has increased during the last century new closing. Through the 40 years represented in 1851-1800 the gold moves ht all countries added to the wealth of the world the enormous sum of \$0,005.011.00r. Tile is more tage double the total amount of the world's gold production from the beginning of the year 1501 to the end of 1850. The production of gold during those three and onehalf centuries aggregated \$3,120,720,000, according to the statement issued by the bureau of statistics at Washington, D. Ch. and approved by the director of the mint.

California has contributed to the world's stock of the precious metal since Marshall discovered it in the Sutter mill thee at Colonia over \$1,400,000,000. This Isequal to one-fourth of the total production of the halt century from all sources, and is nearly one half of the amount of the vellow metal mined between 4501 and 1850. California thus holds a supreme position as a good producer, in not only the record of the latter half of the nineteenth century, but also in the record of the last tout centuries.

During the past four years, the ratio of the world's gold production has increased marvelously. This period shows an aggregate yield of \$1,043,491,000, and represents nearly one-sixth of the half century's contribution to the world's wealth. Of this amount \$247,414,000 was extracted from the placer and quartz mines of the United States, which he chiefly in the territory west of the Missouri river. From This region the world is at present drawing one-tourth of its supply, another fourth having been obtained in 1800 from the Transvanl. The mines of the Rand would have made an even better record last year and the present one had it not been for the war in South Africa. They will make a very small showing, if any

DR. PEARCE'S ROMANCE at all, in the world's record this year, as there is now absolutely no prospect of an early resumption of operations in them.

The foregoing record shows that this is Went East to Take Curtain, traty a golden age. The world may never have seen its equal before. But the increase in production of the precious metal in recent years has been so extraordinarily disproportionate to that of any corresponding period of which we have a record, that a wide field for specutation is opened up for political economists. Mining methods have been so simplified and reduced to such economical basis that the area of production has been immeasurably enlarged, while the processes of extraction are so perfect that all factors of waste have been virtually eliminated.


