DEVELOPMENT—The face of the Grizzly tunnel is now within 5 feet of a point vertical with shaft on 6-foot ledge. CORNUCOPIA DISTRICT.

Much Development Work Being Done and Several Mills Going in.

Marked signs of progress are observable in the Cornucopia mining district, Union county, eastern Oregon, according to Henry Mentle, who has just returned from a two months visit there, looking after properties in which he and others are interested.

"There is the hum of industry about the camp," said Mr. Mentle, "which impresses both the stranger and the resident of its active and commercial life.

"Two stamp mills are running full blast night and day. Extensive development work is going forward on most of the properties, and the camp musters a bucket brigade of 150 pails.

"Enough development work has been done to demonstrate the permanency of the camp. The ledges are well defined, and improve with depth. The Union Companion company have struck richer pay ore at the depth of 1200 feet than near the surface. The very formation of the country gives positive indications of its permanency. The gold bearing ledges are walled in with granite and slate, the true index of fissure veins.

"The rich copper veins recently uncovered near the Snake river are tributary to the Cornucopia group. They have created considerable excitement, and twelve locations were made while I was there. In some instances the copper carries with it gold in paying quantities."

Mr. Mentle said the greatest need of the Cornucopia district was a railroad. One had been surveyed from Union, 60 miles distant, and could be built for considerably less than \$14,000 a mile, as there were no excessively high grades to be overcome. All the supplies are hauled in by team, and the same manner of conveyance takes the concentrates to market.

These are shipped to Tacoma, but could be shipped to Portland much cheaper were a smelter located here, and prove more satisfactory all around. From all parts of Oregon concentrates are shipped to the Sound smelters, and the business resulting therefrom is lost to the people of Portland.

The mineowners, Mr. Mentle says, would like to see a smelter established in Portland for the very good reason that it would save them money.

While absent, Mr. Mentle visited the Sparta district, and says things are also lively in that direction. Colonel Drake, who is interested there with other Portlanders, is, he says, carrying on extensive development work, which proves that they have faith in the proposition. A great deal of the ore is free milling and easily worked. Sparta is the district which has furnished millions of the old placer gold taken out in the tributary streams, and for that reason the tributary streams are thought to be rich. Chinamen still work the old placers, and must take out considerable gold, for they have to pay spot cash for the water they use.—Portland Telegram.
