GRADING LAWTON'S STREETS.**Townsite Company Puts Up Money For Various Improvements.**

Lawton is to have her streets graded and several new bridges are to be constructed along the line of the main thoroughfares leading to the city.

These improvements were determined upon unanimously at a meeting of the stockholders of the company recently held at Pendleton, and Frank G. Hull was delegated by the officers of the Lawton Investment company to assume charge of the work and begin immediate operations. In pursuance to these orders Mr. Hull returned home Saturday and on Monday following actual work had begun. The contract for the work was awarded to J. J. Worcester, at this city, for both the bridge work and grading and graveling. He is an experienced contractor in this line and will fill all the requirements to the letter.

The work determined upon by the Townsite company will involve the grading and graveling of Spokane avenue its entire length, the grading and graveling of Cougar street from the east to its intersection with Spokane avenue, and the construction of bridges across Granite and Clear creeks on Cougar street. The whole will probably cost when finished, upwards of three thousand dollars. The distance to be graded is close to 6000 feet and the entire distance will be covered with a dressing of eight inches of gravel.

Contractor Worcester now has a full force of bridge carpenters and graders prosecuting the work and if possible it will be completed before the advent of winter. He expects to accomplish this by the 25th of the present month.—Lawton Standard.

Will Work Over Old Placer Ground.

Representatives of the Pomery Dredging company, who have been here at work

for some time, have just about completed assessment work for the company on their several claims on Canyon creek. In addition to assessment work, they have also prospected considerably along the John Day river. It is understood that the company will return to Grant county again next year with a view of opening up and working some of their land on Canyon creek by a process that will net the company good returns, regardless of the fact that the entire creek channel has been worked over once or twice before. The Eagle is informed that the company is well pleased with the result of the assessment work on Canyon creek and that there yet remains in the gravel ample gold that will make the ground pay well by the use of the latest improved machinery.—Canyon City Eagle.

Sale of the Rialto Group.

As an evidence of the rapid increase of values in mining property, the Rialto group is a good illustration. About thirty days ago the claims were bonded from Grant Turner and Bob and John Wilson to Grant Thornburg and associates for \$2000. This bond was taken up last week after a 30-foot shaft had been sunk. This week the property was sold for \$25,000 to California parties, and it is considered a good buy at the price. There is a three foot ledge carrying free gold, between a slate hanging and porphyry foot wall. The claims are on a parallel ledge to the Concord and adjoin the May Queen group.—Sumpter correspondent in Spokesman-Review.
