

ANOTHER LOST CABIN MINE.

La Grande Man Will Try to Find it With the aid of an Indian.

Here is a story from the La Grande Chronicle that is so strikingly similar in detail to the method of manipulating the gold brick deal that the promoter of the scheme would be liable to arrest, were it not for the fact of his evident sincerity and frank acknowledgement that there is a chance of failure for the proposition. This is what the Chronicle says:
