LA GRANDE LAND OFFICE.

Record Breaking Business Done in This Land District.

Since the first of January this year over 100,000 acres of land in the La Grande land office district have been filed upon. The area consists chiefly of pasture and timber lands and is situated largely in Umatilla and Wallowa counties and the northern part of Grant. Register E. W. Bartlett says there appears to be no cessation in the settlement of the vacant lands of eastern Oregon.

They are taken by all kinds of people. Some are new comers who desire to make homes. Some are stockmen who are anxious to acquire title to as much pasture land as possible. Others are persons who locate the land for the purpose of using their rights before all the public lands are gone and who expect to dispose of their property as soon as a title is secured. Others make timber filing and will sell or hold the timber on the land until a later date.

According to last year's annual report of the La Grande land office, Umatilla county then contained 824,097 acres of unappropriated land. Its total area is 1,991,000 acres, of which 1,015,543 acres were owned and 151,360 allotted to Indians. On the vacant land 30 per cent and 35 per cent grazing and 5 per cent or 40,000 acres tillable. During the year just past much of this land has been filed on and the next annual report will show interesting changes.

During the six months since January 1st, the total number of homestead entries, 715; mineral entries, 5; desert, 5; coal entries, 103, making a total number of acres of 114,400 in the La Grande district. Seventy-six contests have been settled and 80 are pending. Forty-nine final proofs have been made on home-

steads.

The La Grande is one of the largest in the state and the prospects are that it will continue to be prosperous until practically every foot of the land in the district has become patented. At the present rate, however, it will not be many years before the public land will all be owned by settlers or stockmen.—Pendleton Tribune.

ORDINANCE NO. 122.

An ordinance to amend ordinance No. 20, new series, of the City of Sumpter, entitled "An ordinance to protect the public health and to prevent the introduction or spread of dangerous and contagious diseases," approved February 25th, 1901.

THE CITY OF SUMPTER DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That ordinance No. 20, new series of the City of Sumpter, entitled "An ordinance to protect the public health and to prevent the introduction and spread of dangerous and contagious diseases," approved February 25th, 1901, be amended by inserting the word "chicken-pox after the word measles in sections 6 and 7 of said ordinance, and by erasing the word "or" where the same occurs between the words "dangerous" and "contagious" in said sections 6 and 7, and in section 8, and by erasing the words "typhoid fever" in said section 8.

Section 2. That said ordinance be renumbered and numbered "Ordinance No. 121."
