

MINING NEWS.

Harry E. Hendryx, the mining promoter, was in town this week from Baker City.

Twenty men and four 4-horse teams are at work extending the wagon road from Greenhorn City to the Tempest mine via the Deadwood property.

George Turner arrived in town Monday from Westfall Basin, where he has been doing assessment work on several claims. He left for Baker City yesterday afternoon.

Edmund Haun, for a time owner and operator of the Inter Mountain mine, in the Greenhorns, arrived in the city last Friday. It is his intention to begin work on that property soon.

A. F. Garrison, the Geiser merchant, was a business visitor in Sumpter this week. He says the Bonanza company is constantly increasing its force and that prosperity is abroad in the district.

Work on the Gold Bug-Grizzly will commence between October 1 and 5, and will be pushed for all it is worth. The mine is equipped with machinery and everything necessary for immediate work.

The bunk house and cooking utensils of the Victor Mining company were entirely destroyed by fire last week, the loss amounting to about \$500. It is supposed to have caught from fires started by sheepmen.

A slight cave on the 300-foot level of the Golconda mine last week broke two or three ribs and badly bruised a miner, whose name could not be had at this writing. The ground was very treacherous and the company had it well timbered, so the accident was unavoidable.

O. Townsend, manager of the Baby McKee and Last Chance mines, Cable Cove district, was in the city the first part of the week. He states that work will be commenced at once on the Last Chance; that former announcements to this effect were premature, but now the company is prepared to go to work in earnest.

O. C. Wright, manager of the Sargent Lumber company, whose plant is situated near Lawton, has secured a suite of offices in the Hotel Sumpter, which he will occupy as a mining headquarters during the fall and winter. Mr. Wright has been quite successful in his mining ventures and has strong financial backing.

G. W. Loundagen, a prosperous farmer of Waitsburg, Washington, was in the city last week, seeking an opportunity to invest some of his surplus funds in mining. Mr. Loundagen was the first settler in the Walla Walla country after the army post was established there. He took up a homestead in that vicinity over forty-one years ago.

A Distinguished Visitor.

The Right Rev. B. Wistar Morris, D. D., bishop of Oregon, paid Sumpter a brief visit last week. The reverend gentleman has been in his present high office for the past thirty-five years. Bishop Morris stands out conspicuously before the people of Oregon as the man who has done, more than any other single man, much for this state in a moral and benevolent sense. He established the Good Samaritan hospital and founded St. Helen's Hall, a splendid academy for young ladies, both in Portland; he was also the means of establishing schools, churches and benevolent associations throughout Oregon. For sixty years he has preached to his fellow citizens, and even now, at the venerable age of eighty-three, he is still hard at it, working incessantly for the betterment of mankind and taking care of his ample diocese.

The bishop comes of an old and honorable family, his grandfather being one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. He was highly pleased with the progress Mr. Goodheart was making here in the church line and complimented the ladies for their good work. He preached an eloquent sermon on Sunday evening, and left for the west on Monday's train.

Public Schools Open.

The fall and winter term of the city schools began on Monday last, with 190 pupils in attendance. This number will be greatly increased within one month, as many families now outside will move to town so their children can have school advantages. The enrollment will be larger than in any former year. Professor D. W. Yoder, late of Salem, is the principal in charge, assisted by the following teachers: Miss Teel, seventh and eighth grades; Miss Eckersley, fifth and sixth grades; Miss Greenlee, third and fourth grades; Miss Gillespie, second and third grades; Miss Thomas, chart and first grade.

Wagon Road to Psyche Mine.

A new wagon road will soon be built from the Psyche mine, via the Don Juan, Phoenix and Snow Creek mines, down Snow creek and Burnt river, following a water grade to Whitney. This new improvement is to facilitate the shipment of ores and concentrates to the smelters.
