ALAMO MINE STRIKE. stamps to be added not yet having been TIMBER LAND, ACT JUNE 1, 1878 -NOTICE FOR decided upon.

The Latest News From the General Manager.

James P. McGuigan, of the Alamo mine, came in from the scene of the late strike yesterday and returned today.

He states that the body of ore encountered in the lower tunnel, as recorded Neill Mercantile company's. in THE MINER last week, is holding its own in fine shape. The vein has been crosscut fifteen feet with the best ore in the face.

O., account of an immense inflow of water, the work of crosscutting was discontinued for the present and a drift is being run along the vein. The width of the ore body has not yet been determined, and will not be until the body of water drains off.

Mr. McGnigan says that the values of the ore at this depth are better than in any of the upper levels, that there is about as much free gold, but the sulphides are heavier, and will concentrate three tons into one.

As soon as practicable, the company will erect a stamp mill. The building will be large enough to contain forty stamps, but they may possibly start with no more than twenty-five or thirty, adding the remainder afterward.
