EASTERN CAPITAL FOR OLYMPIA GROUP

Michigan People to Develop Property on Large Scale-T. W. Davidson Makes Deal.

On the report and recommendation of Mining Engineers Browne & Smith, of this city, T. W. Davidson, who returned from the cast a few days ago, placed the Olympia group of claims with Michigan capitalists. These claims include the Olympia, the Sunset, the Venus, the Fractional, the Independence and the Olympia Placer, all situated in the district between Cracker Creek Cracker and Sardine Creeks immeditely west of the famous North Pole mine. Mr. Davidson was first interested in he property by Judge Evans. of this city. He bonded it last December from its original owners, William Phillips and William Niel. who have been in possession of the proprety for the last four years during which time they did considerable development work. Mr. Davidson continued this work, and on his trip east he succeeded in signing the bond over to Michigan capitalists, who, it is understood, will push development, and later when they get around to it, install machinery. Mr. Phillips, one of the original owners, who had a contract for driving a tunnel on the property, was in the city last week and was paid in full for the work done and awarded a contract for 200 feet more tunnel.

The group is considered among the best claims in the Cracker Creek district, and is near the famous Mother Lode, which it parallels on the western side. It is situated alongside the well known Mountain View property which is being developed by Engineer Esselsteyn, for Portland people. Mr. Esselsteyn is a graduate of the Houghton school of mines in Michigan, and was formerly in the employ of Captain De Lamar.

A 500 foot crosscut is now being driven from the Sardine creek side to tap the Venus tunnel, thus giving 125 foot depth of ore. A rich ore body was exposed on Venus tunnel a distance of seventy feet from its mouth. The company has very little to say about its prospective work. but it is understood that developments are to be carried forward with all possible speed and machinery installed when the work has sufficiently advanced.

#### The Mormon Temple.

The Mormon temple at Salt Lake City is no doubt the most substantial and United States, if not in the world, Corner stone laid April 6, 1853, cap stone April 6, 1892 and dedicated April 6, 1893, over forty years of constant labor being consumed in its construction. This magnificen structure 200 feet long, 100 feet wide is built entirely of Utah white granite, beautifully carved, symbolic of the Mormon faith, surmounted by six towers, the highest being 230 feet from the ground, supporting a bronze statue of the angel Maroni.
