Melting Snows Will StopOper-

L. P. Ontlund, owner of the Aretic group of claims in the Cracker Creek instrict, returued to the property to esume development work this week. Mr. Ontlund has been carrying on operations through the winter months, but will have to quit now in a short ime on account of the water in he tunnels from the melting snow. When the snow is gone he will continue operations through the ummer, fall and winter as he did last year.
The Arctic group repreesents seven full chaims, about one mile from the North Pole, on the same vein system. Over 300 feet of development work has been done on the property.
