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TO BUILD SEWER SYSTEM AT ONCE.

Council Will Appoint Engineer to Prepare Plans and Estimates.

It is probable that the city council will take active steps at once toward the building of a modern sewer system during the coming summer. At its last meeting a resolution authorizing the appointment of an engineer to prepare estimates, came up but was not acted upon because of the absence of the mayor and two councilmen. The present sewer system is only a temporary box drain affair and it is proposed to replace this with a modern service to accommodate a city at least double the size of Sumpter, anticipating its rapid growth.

The mayor and council are under stood to be heartly in favor of the movement, and that active steps toward its inauguration are to be taken at once.

No definite estimates as to cost have yet been obtained, but it is stated roughly that the system will cost about \$20,000, though these figures cannot be relied upon. Nor is it yet determined how the money will be raised, whether by bonds or assessments. The city ordinances provide that bonds may be issued for such purposes, or that sewer districts may be created and the property owners taxed in proportion to the relative benefits derived. As it will take some time to build a sewer system, and the work can better be prosecuted during the summer months, it is probable the council will act at once.

Harley Wood Quits the Business.

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


