BIG MILL TO

START JULY 1.

Sumpter Valley Lumber Company Getting Ready to Start Its Plant.

The Sumpter Lumber company started a force of men to work Monday grading and clearing for offics, warehouses, yards and sidings ot the foot of Mill street. A street is to be ut in to run at right angles with Mill street from this location to the site of the big lumber plant soon to be built. In the meantime a big force is kept steadily at work clearing the ground for the mill and getting the big log dam in shape for operations.

According to the company's present plans the mill will be built and in operation by the first of July. The start on the mill proper will, therefore, have to be made at an early date. The plans for the plant, however, are all ready, and the management has been in touch with various machinery concerns for some time so that the necessary equipment can be forwarded at a moment's notice. No delay will be occasioned in this direction.

In he different preparatory operations now going forward, the company is employing about 100 men which force will likely be increased when the big mill starts up.

The Mormon Temple.

The Mormon temple at Salt Lake City is no doubt the most substantial and well constructed religious edifice in the United States, if not in the world. Corner stone laid April 6, 1853, cap stone April 6, 1892 and dedicated April 6, 1893, over forty years of constant labor being consumed in its construction. This magnificen structure 200 feet long, 100 feet wide is built entirely of Utah white granite, beautifully carved, symbolic of the Mormon faith, surmounted by six towers, the highest being 230 feet from the ground, supporting a bronze statue of the angel Maroni. The cost of this building is about \$6,000,000. There are many other attractions at Salt Lake City of interest to the traveler or tourist where a day can be well spent.
