

MILL FOR THE ALAMO.

Plant to be Installed This Summer—Ten Stamps to Start With.

J. P. McGuigan, superintendent of the Alamo, returned today from a visit to his home in Spokane.

Mr. McGuigan will install a mill at the Alamo this summer. Machinery for the ten-stamp will be ordered, but the framing being put in is for twenty stamps, thus providing for the increase in capacity of the plant which is to follow shortly. The mill will be operated by water power, of which there is enough at hand to supply present needs. When the capacity of the plant is increased Superintendent McGuigan is figuring on either conveying in additional water power or getting power from the Red Boy near by.
