Several instances of this kind where well known and thoroughly reliable companies, have been given the worst of it, have come to The Miner's attention. It is disreputable procedure to say the least.

Regarding the rights of co-owners of unpatented mineral claims in relation to the assessment work, the Mining and Engineering Review says: "Disputes often arise in mining sections regarding the rights of coowners of mineral claims and the necessary work required to be performed by each. The law requires that a certain amount of work be performed on each unpatented mineral claim. If that work has been done by one or more of the co-owners and the others have refused to perform their part the proper procedure is that those who have done the work should give the delinquent partners notice, either personally or in writing and by publication in a newspaper published in the county in which the claim or claims are located for ninety days. An attidavit from the publisher of the newspaper that such notice was published and an affidavit from the parties who had served the notice or caused same to be printed must be filed with the Recorder of the county in which the cliam or claims are located, to the effect that one or more of the coowners had refused to pay the necessary expenses to perform their portion of the work or to perform \$25 to \$30 was taken out yesterday, such work , and also a copy of the original notice of location. If the dlinquent co-owner or co-owners do not contribute their share of the expense for the performance of the work required by law within ninety days after the expirattion of the legal notice the title shall be vested in the owners who have performed the work."
