To N. H. Thibault, the above named defendant:

In the Name of the State of Oregon you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause on or before the 8th day of July, 1903, which is the last day of the time prescribed in the order made by the County Judge of Baker County, State of Oregon, for the publication of this summons. And if you fail so to appear and answer, judgment will be taken against you for the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Five and 94-100 (\$2705.94) Dollars, with interest thereon at the rate of ten per cent per annum from the 1st day of March, 1903; the further sum of \$200.00 attorney's fees, and the costs and disbursements of this action, and for the sale of the following described real property attached on the 13th day of May, 1903, and for the sale of the personal property attached on the 15th day of May, 1903, by the Sheriff of Baker County, Oregon, in the above entitled action at the request of plaintiff, to satisfy the above named judgment of plaintiff, to-wit:

The following described real property, situate, lying and being in the County of Baker, State of Oregon, to-wit:

The Don Juan Do Do—Do Do No. 2 quartz mining claims and Don Juan mill site as shown in M. S. 339 in the office of the Surveyor General of the United States for the District of Oregon;
