FOR ALPINE.

MACHINERY TO ARRIVE IN A FEW DAYS.

Colonel Grayson, General Manager, and H. W. Nelson, New Superintendent, Arrive-Alpine Company Reorganized During the Colonel's Late Visit to Cincinnati - Officers and Directors Prominent Business Men-New Mill To Be in Operation by October.

Colonel John Temple Grayson, of Portland, second vice president and general manager of the Alpine Consolidated Gold Mines company, operating in the Cable Cove district, arrived in the city this week with his new superintendent, H. W. Nelson, of Brodie, California, who takes the place of Richard Addoms, who recently resigned the superintendency of the property to look after other interests. The new superintendent is a practical mining man of large experience, having managed a number of well known California properties.

The Alpine is to have a twentystamp mill of sixty tons capacity, and a sawmill with a daily capacity of 10,000 feet right away. The order was placed several days ago with the Risdon Iron Works, of San Francisco, and the consignment is expected to arrive within the next two weeks. A force is now at work making ready in the way of buildings and other preliminary work for the installation of the machinery when it arrives. It is expected to have the mill in operation by October.

During his recent visit to Cincinnati, Colonel Grayson effected a reorganization of the Alpine company, and secured the necessary funds for equipping the mine with up-to-date machinery, and continuing work on a more extended scale. The new officers are well known Cincinnati business men, whose names in this connection carry great weight. Following is a list of the officers and directors:

With the exception of Colonel Grayson, whose residence is in Portland, these gentlemen are all connected with well known business institutions of Cincinnati.

WORK AT SCANDIA.

Long Crosscut Being Driven and Development Vigorously Prosecuted.

W. Wade, superintendent and general manager of the Scandia in the Alamo district, is vigorously prosecuting work on the long crosscut which is to tap the three ledges on the property. He is now in 2,200 feet and has 1,000 feet further to drive.

The crosscut will catch the first vein at a depth of 950 feet and the last at a depth of 1,200 feet. The veius are well defined on the surface, ranging in width from four to fourteen feet, and carrying values of from \$4 to \$30. The ledges have been traced a distance of over 1,600

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
