Ledge, It Is Thought, Will Be Reached Within Ten Or Fifteen Feet.

Tom Gray, superintendent of the Valley Queen, came in this week from the property and reports that the formation in which he is now driving is growing softer with every indication that the main Valley Queen ledge will be reached withi the next ten or fifteen feet. The crosscut now being driven is to form the main working level of the mine, and will tap the vein at a depth of about 200 feet. The crosscut is now in a distance of over 260 feet.
