AUBURN PLACERS.

Machinery Started, and Bedrock Will Probably be Reached in Fifty Feet.

J. E. Reed, superintendent of the Auburn Deep Mining company, operating the Auburn placers, was in the city this week making up his pay roll.

The new hoisting machinery was started up last week and is now in full operation. Superintendent Reed states that the shaft is down 100 feet, having cut through the web foot or false bedrock formation and he expects to reach true bedrock within the next fifty feet. The webfoot showed rich values during the early placer days, and it is argued that if the period of enrichment prior to the webfoot, which is a sort of volcanic mud impervious to the infiltration of placer gold, was equal to the subsequent period, great values may be expected.

To Attend State Meeting of Eagles.

Mayor C. H. McColloch, and R. L. Neill will leave tomorrow to attend the state meeting of the Fraternal order of Eagles to be held at Dalles the 5th and 6th, as delegates from the Sumpter lodge.
