

SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Baker.

To N. H. Thibault, the above named defendant; In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause by the 15th day of July, 1903, which is the last day of the time prescribed in the order made by the County Judge of Baker County, State of Oregon, for the publication of this summons; and if you fail to so appear and answer said complaint judgment will be taken against you for the sum of Five Hundred and Sixty-Seven and 41-100 (\$567.41) Dollars, and interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from and ever since the 20th day of May, 1903, until paid; and an order will be also taken against you for the sale upon execution of the real property, mining property and personal property hereinafter described for the payment of such judgment as said Plaintiff may recover against you in the above entitled action; said property having been duly attached in this action by the Sheriff of Baker County, Oregon, on May 20th, 1903, and by the Sheriff of Grant County, Oregon, May 27th, 1903, at the instance of Plaintiff to satisfy the amount of Plaintiff's claim:

And you are hereby notified that on the 28th day of May, 1903, the Honorable W. W. Travillion, County Judge of Baker County, Oregon, made an order that service of summons in this action be made upon you by publication of summons and that the date of the first publication of this summons is June 3rd, 1903, and the date of the last publication thereof is July 15th, 1903.

The following is a description of the real property and mining property which plaintiff will ask to be sold or the payment of such judgment as he may recover against you, situate in the County of Baker and State of Oregon, to-wit:

The Don Juan, Do Do, and Do Do No. 2 quartz mining claims, situate in Baker County, State of Oregon; the Don Juan Mill Site situate in Baker County, Oregon, and contiguous to the quartz mining claims above described: Also the Susan D., and Big Canadian lode or quartz mining claims situate about 1 and 1/4 miles southwest from the Don Juan quartz mining claim above described in Tp. 10 S. R. 35 E. W. M., in Baker County, Oregon, said claims adjoining the Phoenix mine; also the Belle Ville quartz mining claim situate about 1/4 mile easterly from the Don Juan quartz mining claim above described.
