Presiednt Van Fleet, of the Gold Bug was at the mine Saturday to pay off his force and also get in some more supplies for the winter. These were rails, powder, fuse, and other mining material.

A few days ago, President Van Vicet states that a ten-foot quartzite dyke was cut which occasioned considerable trouble. The dyke is very blocky and would not hang together after it was cut. A chimney about twenty feet high caved and had to be filled up with timbers before the work could proceed. While one of the workmen was up in the hole fixing the timbers, he heard a sudden cracking, and barely escaped before a second block of rock came down, smashing the lagging and piling up things generally. It has been caught up now, however, and work is proceding as smoothly

The new croscsut where the sloughing occrurd is now in over eighty feet, and Mr. Van Vleet thinks the quartzite dyke a good indication that a blind ledge is being approached. No ledge shows in this locality, but these dykes, while barren themselves, usually parallel gold bearing veins. It is something like 400 feet to the main lead for which the present crosscut is being driven. Everything on themine is now in shape for steady work.
