For the first time in twenty three years Oregon finds itself without representation on at least one of the committees that handle the river and harbor bill, but to make matters T. 13 R. 44 E.; \$160. worse Oregon will have no representative on the house committee on industrial expositions, which is to bendle the Lewis and Clark exposition bill

Instead of securing rivers and harbors, which he sought, or insular affairs, which was offered him by Speaker Cannon only a few days ago, R. 38 E. "For the first time in its history, the state of Washington in the present congress far outrank. Oregon in the committee places accorded its members. In the Fifty eighth congrees the Pacific Northwest has no representation on the public lands committee of the house, and will bave little to say in framing whatever legislation is attempted to correct the public land evils."
