#### TO CREATE WATERSHED RESERVE FOR SUMPTER

D. B. Sheller, of Washington, forest superintendent, was here today in the matter of appointing a supervisor to take charge of Baker City watershed reserve, which was set aside by proclamation February 5, 1904, to preserve the purity of the sources of Baker's water supply. Mr. Sheller solicited an application for the position from Van Rensalear Mead, but inasmuch as the office only pays \$75 a month and the man in charge has to pay his own expenses, Mr. Mead declined to file an application for the place. The reserve in question embraces 50,300 acres and the duty of keeping it clear of stock would probably consume one man's entire time.

Mr. Sheller's attention was called to the application of the city counaside northeast of here and covering the head waters of Pole and Wind creeks which furnish the city's water supply, and which, it is claimed, become exceedingly foul during the summer months, on account of the stock being allowed to graze there.

City Attorney Richards, who went there yesterday on business.

He urged the importance of having the reserves created at once, since the fact that the Baker reserve will no longer be available as a stock range, will have a tendency to drive sheep and cattle over to the Sumpter watershed and pollute the water more than ever before. Mr. Sheller realized the situation and promised to take the matter up with Attorney Richards and do all in his power toward the attainment of this end. Mr. Mead who is conversant with the matter from the fact that he was a member of the council when the application was made, and also from his familiarity with the country showed Mr. Sheller the necesity of a speedy granting of the petition, to which he readily assented and pledged his aid.
