Montana: Chemists and assayers are considerably puzzled over a new substance that has been discovered. It is a zinc blende, possessing the property of efflorescence on being EDITOR scratched with a knife blade and is one of the curiosities of Montana's mineral wealth. A number of specimens of this material have been exhibited in Helena, some of which bave such a great degree of luminosity that it is only necessary to scartch the ore with the finger nail to produce a streak of light. After the discovery of radium it was thought this zinc ore might be radio active, but exhaustive tests have been made which go to prove that it has no radium or anything that creates radio activity. The zinc blende has been proven to be the luminescent constituent of the ore. This pecuilar ore is found in the Red mountain districts, in Butte and other mining camps in Montana, and also in California, where a vein has been discovered in Meriposa county, eight feet wide, specimens of which, when scratched with a knife blace, show a bright line of light following the point of the blade. Packing ore out of a mine is always an object of curiosity to mining engineers unfamiliar with conditions in Mexico. Peons with a large leather suck, tilled with ore, will safely and quickly ascend from a deep winze, climbing up the often described chicken indder. The leather suck (or zurron) is carried on the back and is further supported by a broad leather strap, which passes around the forehead. To show how cheaply and quickly a winze can be cleaned and ready for work, it is reliably stated that a winze thirty-five feet deep, twelve feet long and six foot wide, in which four drill men worked during one shift (work ing double-handed in pairs) was cleaned out by two peons in ten hours. The winze was sunk to that depth in thirty-four days, at a cost of \$8.45 Mexican per foot, or \$3.84 United States currency. Not such had work for such a crude way of working.
