# **TACOMA**

## Into Combine With the Selby and Everett Plants.

The now incubating northwestern smelter combine is a queer deal. The people interested are telling the reporters that it is "anti-trust," at the same time acknowledging that the plant at Everett, owned by the American Smelting and Refluinng company, will be turned in to the alleged new company for its stock. Good guessers say that the dominating faction of the trust is merely buying the Tacoma and Selby works with a view to reselling to the American company at a big profit. The latest regarding the deal is the following press dispatch from Tacoms, published in the Spokesman Review: Negotiations whereby the Tacoma smelting plant will be transferred to new hands will not be completed for about 30 days. According to William R. Rust, vice president, general manager and tressurer of the Tacoma plant, there is every indication that the sale will be cousummated in that time and that the ownership of the local smelting works, the Everett smelter and the plant of the Selby Smelting & Lead company of San Francisco will pass to the new company.

The prospective owners are eastern capitalists who were represented during the recent negotiations in San Francisco by Bernard M. Baruch and H. C. Davis of New York. However, Mr. Rust and some of the others who are interested in the local plant will retain their holdings. The new corporation will be "nou-trust," except that the American Smelting & Refining company will have an interest. The Everett plant is at present owned by the latter corporation, which is familiarly referred to as the smelting trust. This company will turn the works at Everett into the holdings of the one corporation and in return will take stock.

Mr. Rust will retain his present position at the Tacoma smelter. Tonight be stated be will continue to hold his interest in the cumpany. While definite plans cannot be announced until the sale is completed, it is certain that the local plant will continue to operate as heretofore. While it was reported several weeks ago that the purchase price for property involved was about \$4,000,000, Mr. Rust was not prepared to either T. 7, R. 46; \$300. affirm or deny this tonight.

One of the latest additions to the local plant is an electrolytic copper refinery, which will be running within a few days. This is the only one in operation west of Great Falls., Mont., and is a notable extension of the Tacoma works.
