Death of Mrs. Schurer

The funeral of the late Mrs. Mary Osborne Schurer, wife of W. R. Schurer of Butteville, Ore., was held Monday in the Congregational church at that place and interment was in the Butteville cemetery at 3:30 p. m., conducted by a Congregational minister of Woodburn, and was one of the largest funerals ever held at that place. Miss Mary Osborne was born in England, Aug. 5, fifty years ago and died here, Oct. 4, where she has resided for the past ten years. She leaves a husband, two stepsons, one brother residing in Michigan and D. M. Osborn of England, who is one of the world's most famous hop buyers. Mrs. Schurer was a neighbor and friend to all alike, both the rich and the poor. She was a great church worker, having sang in the choir and taught in the Sunday School ever since she came among us, and was much loved and respected by all who knew her, both as a church worker and as a business factor in the hop and produce market with her husband who is Butteville's commission and warehouse man, and a son of the late and much honored patriotic Pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. John

Schurer. Mr. Schurer has one brother, Joe Schurer of Butteville and three sisters, Mrs. Carrie Everding, Mrs. Sophie Langford and Mrs. Louis Giltner, all residing in Portland.
